

Remarks on board ship Thomas Dickason, of

Lat 62° 25' N. Wednesday May 28th, 1862.
Strong southeasterly winds, with some snow, rain, and fog. The ship, on opposite tacks. Saw a little ice. Carrying prudent sail. Latterpart moderate variable winds.

Lat 62° 33'. Thursday 29th.
Forepart light variable winds, latterpart moderate southerly. The ship in and around the ice in the vicinity of cape Thadens. Under easy sail.

Lat 62° 58'. Friday 30th.
Forepart light variable winds, latterpart a middling strong northwesterly wind. The ship on opposite tacks by the wind. Carrying prudent sail.

Lat 63° 20' N. Saturday 31st.
Forepart strong northerly wind, middle and latterpart more moderate. The ship on opposite tacks. Saw land and some ice on the west side of the Anadir Sea. Forepart under short sail. Latterpart carrying all sail.

Lat 63° 28'. Sunday June 1st 1862.
Light breeze, principally from the southward. The ship in and around the ice under prudent sail.

Lat 63° 45'. Monday 2nd.
Light northeasterly winds. The ship in, and around the ice, under requisite sail. One vessel in sight.

No observation. Tuesday 3rd.
Moderate southeasterly winds. The ship under prudent sail working along the ice to the northeast.

No observation. Wednesday 4th.
A middling strong southerly wind, with fog, hail, rain, sleet, and snow. The ship under easy sail, on opposite tacks, by the wind.

Bedford, bound on a Cape Horn whaling voyage.

Lat 64° 47' N. Thursday June 5th 1862.
Moderate southwesterly winds. The ship under topsails, steering along the ice to the eastward. About 12 o'clock M. saw land near cape Behring. Caught 3 walrus. Spoke the bark Fanny of New Bedford.

No observation. Friday 6th.
Moderate southerly winds, with some rain and fog. The ship under easy sail, not far from the ice.

No observation. Saturday 7th.
Moderate southerly winds with some fog. The ship around the ice in the vicinity of cape Behring. Spoke the ship Reindeer of New Bedford. Carrying topsails and main topgallant sail.

Lat 64° 43'. Sunday 8th.
Light variable southerly breezes with fog. The ship on opposite tacks, around the ice, under all sail.

No observation. Monday 9th.
Moderate easterly winds. Forepart the ship running along the ice to the westward, latterpart laging aback in a snow storm under prudent sail. Spoke ship John Howard of N.B.

No observation. Tuesday 10th.
Forepart light easterly wind, the ship laging aback in a snow storm. Latterpart a moderate southerly wind, with partly clear weather, the ship on opposite tacks, under topsails.

Lat 64° 50'. Wednesday 11th.
Forepart a light variable wind, principally from the southward, the ship under all sail, by the wind on opposite tacks. Latterpart a middling strong easterly wind with some fog. The ship on opposite tacks, under prudent sail. Saw the ice.
