 This Day Commenced with fresh gales
 and squally at Day Light set West by
 Top Sails Steering N by E. Wind SSW
 Middle part more moderate and
 clear weather latter part
 Much the same Lett By Obs 36, 54 S
 Long By Chron 165, 45 E

Friday May 1st 1840
 Fairbreeze this Day fresh breezes from
 the S.W. steering NNE. and pleasant
 weather. Saw a school of Black porpoise
 Lett By Obs 34, 40 S
 Long By Chron 166, 50 E

Saturday May 2nd 1840
 First part of this Day fresh breezes
 from the S.W. steering ESE. and
 squally weather. Middle and latter
 part fresh breezes and pleasant
 steering E. At 4 o'clock Lett By Obs 33, 34
 Long By Chron 169, 30

Sunday May 3d 1840
 Throughout this Day fresh breezes from
 the S.W. at Day Light made all sail
 steering E. saw and made freshings rocks
 bearing E by S 25 miles distant. At 11 o'clock past
 the N. of them about 10 miles off
 steered E by S about 40 miles and past
 the North Cape of New Zealand took in the
 jet and Dr the topsails. at 8 o'clock PM
 fresh gales and squally took in the
 fore and main topsails North Cape bearing
 SW 20 miles

 Long By Chron at 4 PM
 172, 54 E

Master of Bound towards P. M. Case
 Monday 4th of May 1840
 At Day Light made all sail steering
 on the wind to the E. saw 1 sail
 in shore. the Carall Islands bearing
 S 20 miles distant. at Noon Tacked ship
 steering on the wind to the WSW
 At 7 o'clock Tacked ship heading off
 shore E by S

Tuesday 5th of May 1840
 This Day commences with light
 breezes from the E and very
 pleasant weather. At 4 o'clock AM
 Tacked ship heading in shore WSW
 at Day Light Cape Horn bearing S 15 miles
 Saw 2 ships off the mouth of the
 bay. At 10 o'clock got in to the mouth
 of the bay took in the mainsail
 and stood across from Point Dock
 to Cape Horn the remainder of the
 night

Wednesday 6th of May 1840
 Throughout this Day light breezes
 from most every way. At
 4 o'clock came to anchor in the
 Bay of Islands in company with
 the Schooner of Rochester. And
 Pallard of Havana. Thrown 8 to 10
 American ships in the Bay.

Thursday 7th of May 1840
 All this Day light breezes and
 calm, employed Reinton ship
 and 30
