The first part of these 24 hours calm
an clear middle and last parts much
the same Thursday Dec 5th

Commences with
calm weather and light squalls at
6 AM Joshua Buckle Died of a violent
fever which we called typhus or typhoid
fever from which he had been suffering
5 days Lat 4.40
Long 16.31

Friday Dec 6th

Commences with calm
weather employed boiling blackfish saw-
sterns and lower for them without success
at 5 PM buried Joshua Buckle
middle and last parts light air with some
rain Lat 4.14
Long 16.17

Saturday Dec 7th

Commences with calm
and clear weather middle and last parts
squally no clouds this day

Sunday Dec 8th

Commences with
light and baffling winds with squalls
of rain middle and last parts much
the same Lat 3.00
Long 15.53 West

Monday Dec 9th

Commences with
breezes from the S.E. with passing clouds
ship heading S.W.
last part calm Lat 2.28
Long 16.38

Bonied South
Remarks On Board Tuesday Dec 10th
These 24 hours commences with light
air from the south middle and last parts
calm Lat 2.20
Long 16.25

Wednesday Dec 11th

Commences with
calms and rain middle and last
light air from the south and clear
saw 2 ships Lat 2.41
Long 16.49

Thursday Dec 12th

Commences with
light air from the S.W. ship heading
S.E. 2 ships in sight middle and
last parts much the same Lat 2.35
Long 16.04

Friday Dec 13th

Commences with
light breezes from the S.W. ship heading
S.E. middle and last parts much the
same Lat 2.00
Long 14.58

Saturday Dec 14th

Commences with
light breezes from the S.W. ship.
heading S.E. saw black fish
middle and last parts winds the same
with some rain Lat 1.50
Long 14.12

Sunday Dec 15th

The first part
of these 24 hours calm at 4 PM
saw a school of sperm whales struck
one and the iron broke middle
and last parts light winds from south
Lat 1.30 Long 15.12
