Boats on board, reported 2500 bbls of Whales and 800 of Sperm

Commenced with moderate winds from the S. S. E. and
cloudy steering to the N. W. at 5 P.M. spoke the brig Atlas of
Warren, Middle and latter part winds from S. to S. W. steering

S. W. 24 mi. Dis. by estimation. Lat. by obs. 34-00 S. - -

latter part winds from S. W. and clear so ends all sail set.

All these 24 hours winds from W. S. W. to S. W. steering on
different tracks by the wind, at Noon saw Sperm Whales
so ends the Day Lat. by obs 32-29 S. Long. by Chron. 170-24 E.

At 1 P.M. lowered 3 Boats, at 2 the Leeward and Waist Boats
fastened at 3 took the Whales to the ship, at 4 commenced
d. cutting, at 5 finished, at 4 Am. commenced boiling latter
part moderate winds from S. E. steering W. so ends
boiling Lat. 32-33 S. Long. by Chron. 170-00 E. by bar 169-46 E.

Nov. 14th
Commenced with strong breezes from the S. S. E. and cloudy
