

Remarks On Board Barge

Thursday Aug 3rd 1865
Fine breeze from N steering to the E.N.E
Sett up the M topmast - rising
Lat 44° 36' N
Long 23° 39' W

Friday Aug 4th
Rising with fresh breeze from N.W.
steering E.N.E at night took in sail
and luffed to the wind later
strong winds from S.W. at 8 A.M.
saw a large Sp whale bred the
boats at 9 came on board the whale
going quick to the windward made
fall sail on the ship to work to
the windward after the whale
so ended the whale in sight to the
windward
Lat 48° 06' N
Long 24° 30' W

Saturday Aug 5th
Rising with strong winds from S.W.
working to the windward after the
whale at 4 P.M. saw two whales to
the leeward coming to the windward
at 5 bred the L & Row boats the
Row boat struck bred the vessel boat
at 7 got the whale along side Middle
blowing heavy and squally at 8 A.M.
commenced to drift to the leeward
so ended cutting No 13

Triton of New Bedford Capt Cornell

Sunday Aug 6th 1865
Commenced with strong winds from S.W.
to W cutting at 9 A.M. got the body in at 6
A.M. hooked to the head & parted
the case chain so ended trying to get
the head in No 14

Monday Aug 7th
Fresh breeze from N.W. at 12 P.M.
got the junk in parted from the
case & lost it at 6 commenced
boiling latter good weather boiling
Lat 47° 49' N
Long 23° 00' W

Tuesday Aug 8th
fresh breeze from W on diff. to the
boiling latter strong breeze under
short sail

Wednesday Aug 9th
Strong breeze from N.W. boiling
Middle fresh gale latter more more
Moderate boiling Lat 47° 30' N
Long 24° 00' W

Thursday Aug 10th
Strong breeze from N.W. to N.W.
under short sail boiling Lat 47° 43'
at 7 P.M. finished boiling Long 25° 00'

Friday Aug 11th
Fresh gale from N.W. by day two
on the block put some of the
oil down in the blubber room
and took the boats on the upper craning
