

1844 Ship *Uncas* at the Sandwich Islands
165 days out

Thursday February 15th
Commenced with light
winds and calm ship working from anchorage
to Morue under all sail Middle Part light
winds Latter Part much the same so ends
one ship in sight Morue bearing S.W. Dist 20
miles ship heading N.W.W. beating up for the
Island

196 Friday Feb 16th
Commenced with fine
weather and a fine breeze from S.W. by W
ship heading S.W. by W under all sail the
Island of Taherona bearing S.W. Dist 15 miles
one ship in sight Middle Part much the
same Latter Part fine weather working
in to the harbor of Morue with strong
breeze from S.W. so ends today's time

Saturday Feb 17th
Commenced with fine
weather and a fresh breeze bearing in
to Morue at 3 P.M. gave up the gale. The
ship of before the wind doubled the
the 1/2 mile the anchorage bearing S.W.
Dist 15 miles one ship in company.
Middle & Latter Part much the same working
in to Morue so ends this day

Sunday Feb 18th
Commenced with light
baffling winds working up to the anchorage
with a strong current in our favor in commencing
to crossing the Hercules bar the wind left
us and the current swept us across her
bar bringing her. G.B. boom between our fore
and main mast tore the most boat and B.D.
got tow lines to the HARRISON and cutting pauls
held our ship while the Hercules stuck out
chance leaving us out down to the waters edge
glad to get off so altho their was not any harsh
words. Speak they all met the next morning
as friends and pleasant faces as though nothing had
been said they assisted each other as far as their
means would permit worthy of remark

Ship *Uncas* Sailing in Morue

Monday February 19th
All hands picking up and clearing the
breaking fragments to land

Tuesday Feb 20th
Liberty was given watch and watch
while sailing at Morue and as it went on
till we got our recruits till the 3 P.M. mark
we then had got everything on board fitted for
the S.W. coast so ends this time

Friday March 3^d
Took our anchor board to
Morue to get a cooler five men run away
got two of them by stopping two days we
then took our anchor and stood out to sea
clear of the land stayed two days and went
back again and got one more that got starved
out leaving the other two in the mountains
saying they would not come out till they saw for
fear they should be caught the same day
March 8th bore away for Otovi in company
with the Nantasket of a Gen. London Capt Smith

Saturday March 9th
Commenced with light
variable winds Middle and Latter Part the
same Morue bearing E Dist 25 miles

Sunday March 10th 1844
Commenced with light winds
from the S.E. at 6 P.M. light squalls with heavy
rain Middle & Latter Part wind E rainy dirty
weather Otovi bearing S.W. Dist 15 miles

Monday March 11th
Commenced with light air
from E sailing off Otovi for a chance to go in
and get some sweet potatoes Middle & Latter Part
the same Otovi South Part bearing S.W. Dist 20
miles

Tuesday March 12th
Commenced with fine weather
wind from E Otovi bearing S.W. Dist 20 miles
Middle and Latter the same at day light steering
S.W. by W at 10 A.M. made the Isl of Ouaheone one
of the Sandwich Islands bearing S.W. Dist
30 miles
