This day commences with thick fog
and gloomy times with me although much pleased
that some days that are past and I hope that things
will be more pleasant for future I hope that all
hardness is done away and I hope that every thing will
be more agreeable here after so that we shall be happy
and enjoy the profession we have in

Ship Unceas cruising for Whales

Tuesday July 16th 1845th
commences with

strong winds from N.E. ship under Double reef
topsails whaling leaved 2 boats Wain Boat not lost
and gravel come on board spoke the ship George
Washington capt Russell 2500 - Whale being in thick
weather shortened sail middle & latter part a gale of wind
from N.E. ship had to under storm sails spoke the ship Panama
again but had seen nothing

Wednesday July 15th

commences with a gale of wind
from N.E. ship under Double reef topsails staying W. by N.
three ships in sight at 5 P.M. saw 4 right whales going
quick to the N. middle and latter part a gale from S.E.

Thursday July 14th

commences with strong gale
from N. ship under Double reef topsails saw 4 whales
middle & latter part wind W. one ship in sight

Friday July 13th

commences with strong winds
from W. ship under whole topsails working to the north
spoke the ship Louisa of N. London capt Green
11 months out 1500 - Whale in middle & latter part
balm

Thursday January 1st 1846

Remarks on board Ship Unceas
on her passage from Balchuan to New Bedford
We have now commenced on a new year and as we have
made but little progress in religion in the last year I hope
we shall try to improve our time more to wisdom and live
nearer to our god the coming year as for myself I shall
try to leave off many of my idle ways and try to improve
more of my time in following god's ways and apply my
heart to that which will prove to my everlasting good and
oh may I set a better example before my ship mates
that they may profit there by and I hope the remainder
of my days I shall be wise for my own soul sake and
try to encourage others to go with me for I find that
unless we try to do the will of our heavenly father we
cannot enjoy our selves here and we must all do that unless
to us is right here we cannot receive that crown which
is set before us
