Long 148° 00'

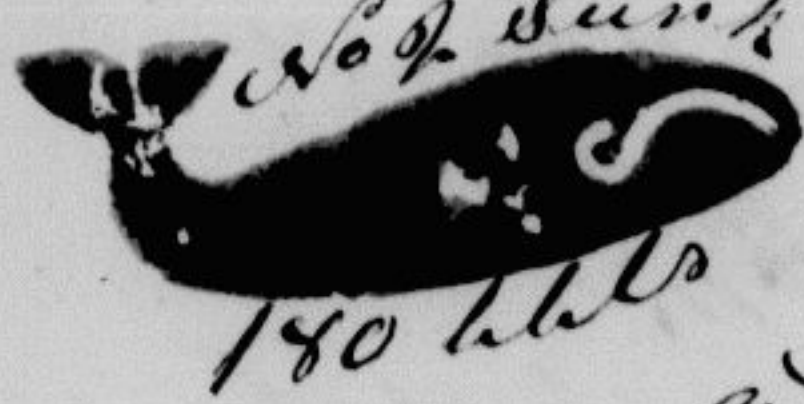
Sunday May 19th

fog mid and latter fresh wind from SW
fine weather saw one ship

Monday May 20th
fore part fine weather steering NE
at 6 PM spoke the Archer of New Bedford
18 months 300 bls mid and latter part
fresh winds from the South steering
W & NW saw fin backs and plenty of birds

Lat 53° 50' N
Long 147° 30' W

Tuesday May 21st
fore part strong wind steering South
at midnight saw a right whale, lamed
and sunk him



mid and latter part
strong breezes from
SE & S by E saw whales
and chased got nothing

Lat 54° 30'
Long 148° 00'

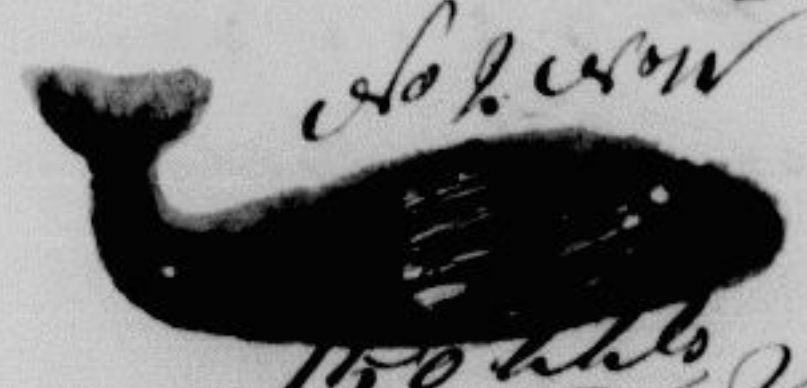
Wednesday May 22nd 1846
fore part strong winds and fog
nothing sight at 4 in sail for
the Regt mid and latter part
strong winds from the South

Lat 54° 52'
Long 147° 50'

Thursday May 23rd
all this day good weather nothing in
sight but two ships at 4 PM
spoke the Lafayette of New Bedford
10 months 550 & from 180 whale

Lat 55° 10'
Long 147° 30'

Friday May 24th
all this day fog strong winds from
the South saw whales and chased
got nothing two ships in. same



Lat 55° 10'
Long 147° 40'

Saturday May 25th
all this day fresh breezes from the
South toward for right whales got up
to one and hit him right in the
fore consequently spit the foam
out again at 11 struck one and
saw him had weather thick and
rainy and cutting finished
and commenced hauling

Long 146° 51' W

spoke the
Benham of New Bedford
18 months 400 bls
