

Friday Oct 30 1846
all this day fine weather wind
from South at 2 PM struck a
whale at 6 took him to the ship
at 4 finished cutting fine weather
Lat 42° 38' N
Long 76° 10' W

Saturday Oct 31st
fore part moderate and fine weather
5 ships in sight all chasing whale
but very little mid and latter part
moderate and fine weather saw whales
and chased got nothing Lat 42° 42' N
Long 76° "

Sunday Nov 1st
fore part light winds from
from the North spoke the James Munroe
of Fairhaven 30 months 2000 lbs
latter part strong winds and squally
dew rain do ends

Monday Nov 2nd
at midnight wind shifted to the
SE 8th fine made sail at 4 hauled
and caught a whale at 6 took him
to the ship mid and latter part
strong winds from SE
heavy squalls at 5 commenced
cutting run before the sea
at 9 finished came to headed to the SE
do ends
Lat 44° 55' N
Long 76° 00' W



Tuesday Oct 31st 1846
all this day strong winds from SE
at 4 PM wore ship to the SE in place
hoiling and stowing down
do ends

Wednesday Nov 3rd
fore part strong winds from SE
squally stowing down and hoiling
mid and latter part much the same winds
Lat 45° 33' N
Long 76° 00' W

Thursday Nov 4th
fore part moderate and fine weather
chasing whale at 3 PM finished hoiling
spoke the Chile of Essex Bedford 16 months
2000 lbs latter part calm in place stowing
oil at 11 hauled for whale without
success
Lat 45° 36' N
Long 76° 00' W

Friday Nov 5th
fore part moderate winds from SE
fine weather finished stowing down
at 4 PM took in sail wore ship to the
SE mid and latter part strong winds from
the North at daylight wore ship to the
West rain do ends
Lat 45° 00' W

Saturday Nov 6th
fore part wind from SE blowing
heavy turned up the mast boat
back the lower boat up to the day in head
at 9 PM in fore sail heavy squalls
latter part more moderate at midnight
at the fore sail wore ship to the SE
5 ships in sight
Lat 44° 13' N
