

Sunday Jan 18th 1846
fore part strong winds from WSW
at 6 wind started to the WSW more ship
to the SSW under short sail mid and
latter part strong winds from WSW
thick weather No End Lat 44° 50

Monday Jan 19th
fore part fresh winds from WSW at
morning more ship to the north
at single reefed topsails at 4 PM
more to the SSW and took in sail
mid and latter part strong winds from
the WSW rain and fog No End

Tuesday Jan 20th
fore part strong winds from the WSW
thick fog heading to the SSW and no sign
of any change mid and latter part strong
winds from north heading to the west at
tacked to the W at 11 took in fore topsail
jib and spanker more ship to the west

Wednesday Jan 21st
fore part strong gales from north rain
at 4 PM hoist reefed main topsail in
foresail head to the W middle strong
gales from north at 10 wind started to
the W more to the north 3 ships in
sight Lat 45° 34
Long 78° 40

Thursday Jan 22nd
fore part strong winds from SSW laying
head to the SSW spoke the Hudson at
Bay Harbour 1200th Manthos mid and latter
moderate fresh breeze Squally Saw finches
and a few right whales Lat 46° 30
Long 77° 58

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Friday Jan 23rd 1846
fore part strong winds and squally
heading to the north a number of
ships in sight mid and latter part
strong winds from WSW saw a few whales
and plenty of ships Lat 46° 38
Long 78° 00

Saturday Jan 24th
all this day fine weather light air
plenty of ships but few whales
towed got nothing so Ends
Lat 45° 38
Long 76° 20

Sunday Jan 25th
all this day fine weather at 1 PM saw
a whale hauled caught him found
4 prongs in him with same line
and poles attached to them at 3 hauled
and struck a whale.

Monday Jan 26th
commenced with strong winds from
the west steering to the north employed
staving Oil spoke the pris of from Bay
hauled home Lat
Long 76° 18

Tuesday Jan 27th
strong winds from SSW steering in to the east
spoke the general de Scott fisher
31 manthos 1900 at 6 saw whales
hauled struck and drew the prong
Lat 45° 06
Long 76° 00
