

Monday Jan. 11th 1852
calm fine weather cutting at
8 PM finished mid squally some
rain later fresh winds from south
saw 4 large quantities of large
whales going fast to the N.W.
struck and lost the line so end

Tuesday Jan. 12th 1852
fresh winds fine weather
same of the whales still in
sight on the weather bar
and going to windward at 3 PM
spoke ship P. Healy of Mexico
bailing not the whys but Atlantic
middle and later strong winds
fine weather heading to the west
wind southerly bailing so ends

Wednesday Jan. 13th 1852
commences strong winds from
south heading to the west at 6 PM
moderate large swell employed bail-
ing mid and later part calm squally
same rain &c.

Thursday Jan. 14th 1852
same part strong winds squally
at 6 PM finished bailing more
ship to the N.E. middle and part
same squally so end

Friday Jan. 15th 1852
same part fresh wind from the west
steering eastward finished bailing at
6 PM mid fine weather later part
fresh winds from south heading east
by the wind so ends

Saturday Jan. 16th 1852
same part fine weather wind from
south at 4 in sail more ship to the
west mid and later part moderate and
fine weather employed steering
sperm oil saw one ship whale

Sunday Jan. 17th 1852
same part moderate and fine calm
weather finished steering at 5 PM
by head to the S.E. wind easterly mid
and later part fine weather mid back
in sight one steering to the south the
other to the N.W.

Monday Jan. 18th 1852
same part fresh winds and fine
weather at 3 PM saw the bark
whaling headed for him saw the
whales saw him take one at 4 PM
struck and ourselves at 8 took him
to the ship middle strong wind
from N.E. later the same at 5
more ship with the whale
commenced cutting found it
ragged
