 part much the same
 Lat 42.40
 Long 59.40

Monday March 22
 Commences fine weather mid
 most high swell at 9 PM same
 two right whales toward caught
 none mid fine weather high swell
 Barometer falling latter part heavy
 Gale from SW head to the SSE
 chain the whales in 50 fathoms
 Long by Chron 58.48 and ship in
 sight No Ah

Tuesday March 23
 heavy Gale from SW at 1 exchange
 signals with ship Saratoga at
 New Bedford mid and latter part
 moderate Spoke the S had 1300 lbs
 so ends Lat 42.20 Long 57.50

Wednesday March 24 1852
 fine weather in company with
 the Saratoga mid and latter calm
 at 10 took a small breeze from
 the East Steamed off by 12 Lat 42.02

Thursday March 25
 fresh winds from the SSE at night
 in sail head to the SE same rain squally
 mid squally thunder latter part fine
 weather Lat 41.15
 50 fathoms

Friday March 26
 fore part fine weather mid squally
 same thunder latter part fine weather
 sailing with the Saratoga best for
 2 miles per hour right & windward
 Lat 41.28

Saturday March 27
 commences with fresh winds from
 the West mid and latter the same
 Stearing to the East 46 fathoms water
 Lat 43.07
 Long 57.14 (Chron)
