killed No whale of the Right kind
The Camilla took them all mid and
latter part fine moderate variable

Thursday July 19
wind WNW heading to the SW by the
wind two sail in sight mid and
latter part fine weather wind
WNW heading to the SW by the wind
Lat 44° 02' Long 29° 14'

Friday July 20
wind WNW at 1 boarded the ship
from the from Harve for
St. John 445 passengers mid and
latter part fine weather wind from
the WNW heading to the SW by the wind
Lat 42° 52' Long 30° 06'

Saturday July 21st
fine weather light wind from
the WNW at 9 boarded the King
Charles of St. John 10 days from
Liverpool for St. John mid and
latter part moderate fine weather
4 sail in sight
Lat 41° 28' Long 30° 51' 2/3

Sunday July 22 1860
fine weather wind to the South head to
the WNW by the wind very smooth
but nothing in sight mid and latter
part moderate and very fine weather
Good enough for the ladies
Lat 41° 50' Long 31° 31'

Monday July 23
fine calm weather three sail in
sight went off and shot two Grampales
and saved neither of them both sunk
so quick that could not get time to keep them
up mid and latter part fine calm weather
late of sails in sight
Lat 42° 01' Long 32° 20'

Tuesday July 24
light air from the SW fine and
pleasant at 4 PM went on board of
Bark. Macaser of Hamburg 140 days
from Batavia for Glasgow mid and
latter part fine weather at 4 PM saw
Sperm whales a long way off before
they quit their before dark have seen
nothing more of them today saw plenty
of sails mostly ships
Lat 42° 10' Long 33° 06'

Wednesday July 25
fine weather at 1 saw a Bark cutting
a whale mid and latter part fine weather
the Bark cutting was the King Fisher
Lat 42° 03' Long 33° 14'
