Nov 26

1851

Remarks onboard Wednesday Nov 26 1851
 First part of this day fresh gale from SE
 and squally with rain latter part tremendous
 gale from WNW with uncommon heavy squalls
 with high sea running from SE at 2 AM
 the wind started to WNW and blew as they at sea
 at 7 AM sounded and had 20 fathoms of water
 and heeled to the starboard the shoals of Long
 at 7 AM took in the three reefs fore sail and lay
 her under a storm fore sail and a bark lying
 under close reef fore sail ahead to the North
 Lat 41-00 Long 88-54

Nov 27

1851

Remarks onboard Thursday Nov 27 1851
 First part of this day fresh gale from WNW
 and squally latter part gentle breeze from
 NNE and fine sounded and had 25 fathoms
 water so ends this day standing to the Westward
 Lat 41-42 Long 89-51

Nov 28

1851

Remarks onboard Friday Nov 28 1851
 First part of this day gentle breeze from
 NNE and airy squally latter part gentle
 breeze from WNW with rain saw three
 seals rising S.E. so ends this day
 Lat Long

Nov 29

1851

Remarks onboard Saturday Nov 29 1851
 First part of this day fresh gale from
 NNE West and squally with rain latter part
 fresh breeze from NNE and squally
 saw two seals standing to the North of our ship
 at 9 AM made the high land bearing W by South
 Dist 12 miles so ends this day all well

Nov 30

1851

Remarks onboard Sunday Nov 30 1851
 First part of this day fresh breeze from NNE
 at sund set in 8 miles to theeward of the high
 land light put up under Double reef and ran
 to anchor at 8 AM in Provincetown Harbour

March 24

1852

Remarks onboard Wednesday March 24 1852
 At 10 AM left Provincetown for a Whaling
 voyage with a light air from NNE at 4 PM
 High Land light bore S.W. Dist 10 miles
 wind from S.E. a gentle breeze sound the day
 Lat Long

March 25

1852

Remarks onboard Thursday March 25 1852
 First part of this day gentle breeze from
 S.E. and cloudy latter part fresh breeze
 from S.E. and thick with rain took in
 Double reef so ends this day running S.E.
 Lat None Long None

March 26

1852

Remarks onboard Friday March 26 1852
 First part fresh breeze from NNE and clear
 latter part more moderate saw several seals bound
 to the Westward saw one seal of Black fish
 and one seal of Porpoise so ends this day
 Lat 39-48 Long 84-51

March 27

1852

Remarks onboard Saturday March 27 1852
 First part of this day calm latter part fresh
 breeze from West and squally saw one seal of
 Porpoise also a Bark beyond to the Eastward
 this day ran out of the stream so ends this day
 Lat None Long None

March 28

1852

Remarks onboard Sunday March 28 1852
 First part of this day fresh breeze from NNE
 middle light air from North latter part fresh breeze
 from East and squally with Thunder lightning
 and rain saw one seal of Porpoise so ends this
 day lying under Double reef fore sail and
 Lat None Long None
