greeable. Seas rough. Vessel lying  
to under lower topsails.

Wednesday-13-

Very strong winds from the N.W.E.  
and seas rough. Weather cloudy  
and misty. Vessel under lowest  
topsails on port-tack.

Long. 46.24

Thursday-14-

Strong westerly winds and  
seas rough. I got so I can  
write it without looking at the  
look. Light rain all day. Weather  
looks bad. Have not had men  
madehead for a week. Vessel  
on port-tack.

No do.

Friday-15-

Moderate N.E. winds and smoky  
weather. Seas fairly smooth. Vessel  
cruising under upper topsails.  
Saw a large whale in the morn-  
ing going fast to windward. Did not  
make.

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Saturday-16-

Strong N.E. winds and squally  
weather. Sea very rough. Vessel  
cruising under lower topsails.

Lat. 33.20

Long. 46.14

Sunday-17-

First part of day had fresh N.E.  
winds and cloudy weather, latter  
part rain and wind went around  
to S.W. and back to the eastward and  
died down to almost calm.

Calm and rain all day.

Tuesday-19-

First part of day calm, latter  
part light airs from the west.  
Weather clear. Saw plenty blackfish  
and grampus.

and ended with strong south winds  
and puffy. Seas quite high. Weather  
clear. Saw grampus and porpoises  
and a shark.

Came N.E. All sail out.
