

Remains under board. Bark P. M. Rainsie

Tuesday, Oct. 25. 1856. Lat. 11.20. Long.

P.M. Wind the same morning hard. Sunset by the wind under the sails. Nothing in sight. Middle and latter part strong winds with heavy squalls of wind.

Wednesday Oct. 26. 1856. Lat. 10.32. Long. 36.27

P.M. Weather the same. Frequent squalls. Went round at dark heeling to the Eastward. Nothing in sight. Middle part strong winds with continual squalls of rain from S.E. No trades yet working to the Southward star and tack.

Thursday Oct. 27. 1856. Lat. 10.12. Long.

P.M. Weather the same. Sunset on the Southern tack by the wind. Nothing in sight. Middle and latter part moderate winds from S.E. have been employed at ship's duty.

Friday, Oct. 28. 1856. Lat. 08.10. Long. 34.36

P.M. Wind working over to the Eastward and clear weather. Sunset heading P.E. by the wind. Nothing in sight. Middle and latter part light Easterly winds. Have been employed cleaning blocks aloft.

Saturday, Oct. 30. 1856. No Observation

P.M. At two past a merchant bark steering to the Northward. Sunset ship heading P.E. Nothing in sight. Middle and latter part squally weather. Employed at ship's duty got the cutting stage ready. John Loaf went below to day of duty with sore legs. Disease contracted at home.

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Sunday, Oct. 31. 1856. No Observation

P.M. No change in the weather. Continual squalls from P.E. Sunset heading to the Eastward. Nothing in sight. Middle and latter part strong winds. A number of sails in sight.

Monday Nov. 1. 1856. Lat. 05.30. Long. 31.32

P.M. No wind. Once in a while a squall. Sunset calm. Two sails in sight. Steering same way. Middle and latter part light Easterly winds with squalls of rain. Have been employed at ship's duty. Two sails in sight going same way.

Tuesday, Nov. 2. 1856. Lat. 04.30. Long. 31.51

P.M. At one went round and again at three. Sunset by the wind on the Southern tack all sail set. Two sails in sight. Middle part light winds with squalls. Employed at ship's duty.

Wednesday, Nov. 3. 1856. Lat. 04.15. Long. 31.45

P.M. Moderate winds from P.E. Sunset went round heading to the Eastward. Two sails in sight. Middle and latter part light winds and fair some times steering S.E. Employed heaving out fresh water and filling up with salt.

Thursday, Nov. 4. 1856. No Observation

P.M. Moderate winds with frequent squalls of rain. Two sails in sight steering same way. Sunset went round on the Western tack. Middle and latter part squally weather. Employed breaking out for provisions.
