

Remarks made on board Bark T^m Baylis

Friday Apr. 15. 1887. No Observation

P.M. Light N.E. winds. Reindier in sight. Sunset calm. Whistle and latter part light winds. Capt. went on board Bark Reindier at sun.

Saturday. Apr. 16. 1887. No Observation

P.M. Barring. Calm. no wind. Latter part went into the ice with Bark Reindier working to the Northward.

Sunday. Apr. 17. 1887. No Observation

P.M. At work working through the ice. Whistle and latter part the same. Employed the same

Monday. Apr. 18. 1887. No Observation

P.M. All ice and working through. Reindier in sight. Latter and whistle part calm. Spoke Steamer Thrasher bound North.

Tuesday. Apr. 19. 1887. No Observation

P.M. Working through heavy ice with steam. Reindier in sight. Whistle and latter part calm.

Wednesday. Apr. 20. 1887. No Observation

P.M. Got the Ship heading for clear water again. Reindier also. Sunset four sails in sight. Got into clear water at midnight. Day light ran to the Westward and made the ice with the following named vessels. Reindier. Bounding Billow. Plecting. Pancer and one name unknown.

Remarks. Montrose Master

Thursday. Apr. 21. 1887. Lat. 61. 34. Long. 176. 37. E.

P.M. Forcing through ice. Benjamin Santos (Cook) was sent forward to day by the Capt. Edward Pymore put in in his place. Latter part in the ice working to the North. Spoke Brigg Radalge.

Friday. Apr. 22. 1887. No Observation

P.M. In the ice. Eight sails in sight all working same way. Whistle and latter part calm. Employed generally.

Saturday. Apr. 23. 1887. Lat. 61. 35. Long. 176. 5

P.M. Got up steam hauling through ice. Land in sight bearing N.E. distant twenty miles. Whistle and latter part light N.E. winds.

Sunday. Apr. 24. 1887. No Observation

P.M. Got in clear water ice and the Brigg Radalge. Brigg lowered for a Whale but did not get him. Sunset laying aback. Twelve Ships in sight. All working North. Latter part in the ice. Wind increasing from N.E.

Monday. Apr. 25. 1887. Lat. 61. 45. Long. 176. 15. E

P.M. In all sail. Saw our first Whale to day but did not lower. Whistle and latter part laying in the ice no sail out.

Tuesday. Apr. 26. 1887. No Observation

P.M. Saw three Whales went on the ice to them but could not get them could not have a boat. Whistle and latter part employed generally. Nothing but ice in sight.
