

Remarks made on board Bark. Mary Baylies

Monday, Aug. 1. 1887.

P.M. Working the Eastward. Andrew & Mike
working rather rough through ice. Middle part
got in five fathoms of water. were off
shore thick fog.

Tuesday, Aug. 2. 1887.

P.M. Steered in towards the land with
clear weather. At nine P.M. anchored
off main night inlet. Bark Mary &
Lucan also anchored. Little and latter
part having at anchor off main night inlet.

Wednesday, Aug. 3. 1887.

P.M. Laying at anchor. Mary & Lucan. Sea Breeze
& Ocean. Latter part the Bear came in to an
anchor. Employed repairing Wiggins & Smith
stay sail.

Thursday, Aug. 4. 1887.

P.M. Got under way working up to Point
Belcher. Wind North. Latter part working
up towards Sea Horse Islands.

Friday, Aug. 5. 1887.

P.M. Sea Horse Islands in sight with plenty
of open water. Mary & Lucan Cancer in sight.
Latter part moderate winds from the Northward.

Saturday, Aug. 6. 1887.

P.M. Rowed for 2 hours going quick did not
get any. Point Barrow in sight bearing N. E.
Latter part moderate North wind saw a number
of whales in the air did not lower.

Saturday, Aug. 7. 1887.

P.M. For working in towards the land worked in
to the land and anchored South of it. A Barker. Sea
Breeze. Latter part took our anchor board to Cape
Smith.

Monday, Aug. 8. 1887.

P.M. Came to an anchor off Cape Smith. Found
all the Steamers at anchor. Latter part the ice
working inshore quick got a large flow under
the boat which carried me on shore got her off
again all right.

Tuesday, Aug. 9. 1887.

P.M. Took our anchor and went further to
the Northward and anchored again. Latter part
park ice aboaring in on the land. Hauled in
shore further to keep clear of it.

Wednesday, Aug. 10. 1887.

P.M. Took our anchor board for Point Barrow.
Came to an anchor at four off the point in
a calm. Saw steamers in the ice moving.
Latter part moderate winds from the North which
started the ice I am took our anchor went round
to leeward of Point Barrow. Young Phoenix in
getting underway got ashore.

Thursday, Aug. 11. 1887.

P.M. Wind the same. Young Phoenix still a
shore. Middle and latter part still blowing
from N. E. Young Phoenix still a shore in
a critical condition.
