

Remarks made on board Bark *Wm. Bayliss*

Wednesday Aug. 24. 1887.

P.M. Spoke the *Grampus* bound into the point - so we kept off and came to anchor at four. Weather thick and foggy. Middle and latter part clear weather but blowing strong. Employed breaking out

Thursday Aug. 25. 1887.

P.M. Still a blowing from the N.E. Peter Borne was put in irons to day he refusing to go to the mast head. Day blowing hard. Three steamers coming in got underway at six it rained in thick again so had to anchor. sent a boat on shore checking.

Friday Aug. 26. 1887.

P.M. Weather thick. Proa arrived to day with twenty Whales. Day P.M. wind moderating and clear. Latter part got a breeze from the N.W. got underway went out to cruise

Saturday Aug. 27. 1887.

P.M. Strong N.W. winds and plenty of scattering ice. Day P.M. standing in towards the point. Middle and latter part strong winds from the Northward with snow. Lancer got a whale to day.

Sunday Aug. 28. 1887.

P.M. Strong winds. Lowered for a whale going quick to the Westward did not see him again. Middle and latter part thick weather with snow. At nine began to moderate and working to the westward

Monday Aug. 29. 1887.

P.M. Wind N.W. and light. Kept off for Point Barrow. Lancer two steamers steering N.E. Latter part arrived off Point Barrow could not get in owing to ice making on the land.

Tuesday Aug. 30. 1887.

P.M. Spoke the Lancer sailing. Day P.M. working to the Westward. Wind N.W. and light. Middle and latter part moderate winds. Have been working to the Westward.

Wednesday Aug. 31. 1887.

P.M. No change. Day P.M. three sails in sight bound same way. Plenty of ice. Latter part wind moderating. Employed securing the anchors.

Thursday Sept. 1. 1887.

P.M. Light variable winds from North to S.W. Steamers and Wanderer & Ring in sight bound same way. Middle and latter part calm.

Friday Sept. 2. 1887.

P.M. A light North wind. Sailing Bark. Wind ever. Day by the wind on the Western side. Middle and latter part wind increasing. Sailing Bark. Wave & Sea Breeze.

Saturday Sept. 3. 1887.

P.M. Thick fog having abate to leeward of the ice. Middle and latter part strong winds from the Northward. Are working East
