

Remarks onboard Dr. Wm. Dwyer

Tuesday Feb 28 1888.

P.M. At Anchor. employed making storm sails for the boats a fine night morning, wind to the N.W. hands employed in sail mending so ends

Wednesday Feb 29 1888

P.M. Still at Anchor gave a boats crew a run ashore this afternoon, a pleasant afternoon. At ten A.M. Christopher, McConnell, died after long sickness of dropsy. morning the Capt. Montross went ashore and got a permit to bury him with at North

Thursday March 1 1888.

P.M. At two o'clock put the corpse in to a boat and two more boats took it to shore with all but a few of the crew and went ashore to bury his remains at half past five the boats came on board a fine night wind at south west. morning set up rain. Jap. Gallat to voyal back stave. Cook went ashore yesterday and did not return so ends.

Friday March 2 1888

P.M. first fourth to fifth officers went ashore. at half past three sent the Cook onboard in cross. keep him in irons all night. from four until eight had him strung with his hands over his head, fine night expect to sail today wind North West so ends

Saturday March 3 1888.

P.M. At three o'clock took over anchor and stood to sea having shipped two men at seven steam. N.W. by North calm all the rest of the night. morning at seven a light wind sprang up broke out raps for cork & gave the men cloths. One paper stoway onboard. so ends

Therace Montross, Master

Sunday March 4 1888 Lat. 29° 53' Long. 141° 05' North East
P.M. a fine wind from the S. East course N.W. West strong wind during night. at 9 A.M. raised a sail which proved to be the Whaler B.K. Lancer at work breaking out water so ends

Monday March 5 1888 N^o Observation

P.M. at half past twelve the Lancer hauled a back and Capt. White sides came onboard finished ganning all six shortened sail and stood to the starboard until midnight 12 A.M. wore ship and stood to the N. East until three at daylight Lancer on our starboard quarter all eight kept off and Capt. Montross went on board hands employed in ships duty so ends.

Tuesday March 6 1888 Lat 30° 1' Long 141° 05'

P.M. at six Capt. Montross came onboard and wore ship and stood to the S.W. strong wind from the N.W. all night morning hands employed in fitting the new mast so ends

Wednesday March 7 1888 Lat 29° 56' Long 140° 50'

P.M. on ships duty at half past three sighted a ship running off proved to be the Lancer at dark wind at N.W. strong wind during the night morning employed in cutting boat covers and repairing the held sheets so ends

Thursday March 8 1888 Lat 29° 53' Long 140° 50'

P.M. hands employed in ships duty wind let North at dark Lancer on the starboard covering the night wind at S. East steering N.E. by North morning hands employed at ships duty Lancer on our bow so ends
