

Remarks made on board D.K. W. Baylies

Saturday March 17/1888 No Observations
P.M. the squalls not as heavy as at
noon. At yesterday, at dark, it has
moderated considerably ship still under
lower topsails a heavy sea running
at day break made some sail
at nine A.M. weather much better
course N.N. East. so ends

Sunday March 18/1888. No Observations
P.M. ship under topsails courses and
main top Gaff sail. At five come N.N.E.
during the night it moderated
and made more sail on the ship
at daybreak calm at eight A.M. it
began to breeze at noon blowing
a fresh breeze. Come N.N.E. so ends

Monday March 19/1888 Lat 44-11 Long 66-40
P.M. hands employed in ship's duty
the wind has hauled to the S. East
blowing strong course N.W. by E. half E.
at noon it fell into rain and it continued
to all night and very heavy rain
came down to close up. At day break
made sail at eight A.M. the wind
hauled to the S.W. and increased
so ends

Tuesday March 20/1888. North East
Lat 47-36 Long 63-47
P.M. hands employed in ship's duty the
wind has hauled to the west North West
Ship under whole top sails & courses.
course North by East during the night
had several snow squalls with the
hailing slowly to the southerly at
nine A.M. wind at South East strong breeze
and continued from that quarter
the rest of the day so ends

Wednesday March 21/1888 North East
Lat 52-21 Long 67-34
P.M. hands employed in ship's duty
at 2 o'clock the wind began to haul
to the South East, at dark wind S.E.
course N.W. by E. half East. a strong breeze
until eleven when it began to moderate
at three A.M. a calm and continued
so until nine o'clock when a breeze
sprang up from the North and remained
so the rest of the day so ends

Thursday March 22/1888 North East
Lat 52-12 Long 65-17
P.M. hands employed in ship's duty
a mild wind from the North at ten
wind hauled a little to the Eastward at
seven tacked ship and stood to the
N.W. At eleven tacked and stood to the
Eastward tacked again at seven A.M.
ship heading N.W. by West so ends

Friday March 23/1888 North East
Lat 52-24 Long 66-10
P.M. hands employed in ship's duty
at one tacked to the Eastward seeing
a fin back whale. At dark the ship
heading N. East by North stood to the
Eastward all night at six am. tacked and
stood to the N.W. at eight it fell away
calm and remained so the rest of the day
so ends

Saturday March 24/1888 No Observations
P.M. hands employed in ship's duty
at two o'clock the wind sprang up from
the same quarter and had a light squall
at dark tacked and stood to the N. East
and kept her so all night at day
break tacked and stood to the N.W.
at nine A.M. it fell away calm
so ends this day
