

Remarks made onboard P.M. Baylis
North West

Wednesday June 6th 1888 Lat Long
P.M. Hands employed in hauling up
and bending cables and getting the starboard
anchor in the shoe. raised the land at
six o'clock on our starboard beam
wind at North no ice in sight
worked to the N.E. during the middle
and latter part of the day sounds

Thursday June 7th 1888 Lat Long
P.M. Hands employed in ships duty
land is about five miles off the
weather has been calm wind light
from the South-East worked to the eastward
during the middle and latter part of the
day spoke the Schooner Alon sound

Friday June 8th 1888 No Observation
P.M. Hands employed in ships duty
worked up to last light saw
one whale natives came on board
lowered for whales during the latter
part spoke the Mangt Susan sounds

Saturday June 9th 1888 No Observation
P.M. off Indian Point several ships
whaling two whales taken.
have lowered several times got nothing
wind at North one ship forcing and
forcing in sight downed a whale at
four P.M. got nothing sounds.

Sunday June 10th 1888.
P.M. off Indian Point Hands employed
in ships duty lowered three boats and
crused for whales saw nothing anchored at six
at ten P.M. wind died away calm. at took
anchor and stood to the south east dropped it again
at three P.M. at seven took it again
wind at east. stood off and on during the
latter part of the day sounds

Monday June 11th 1888.

P.M. Worked to the Northward wind at
N.W. lowered for a whale got nothing
spoke the Hm Balara. kept off and ran
down to the point sounds

Tuesday June 12th 1888

P.M. Hands employed in ships duty
lowered for a whale got nothing stood
into the point. at half past five dropped
anchor wind at North. looked off
a whale did not get any wind at North
sounds

Wednesday June 13th 1888.

P.M. at anchor three ships off the point
and seventeen at anchor. hauled by. during
the middle part light winds at eight P.M.
took on anchor and ran to the south west
about ten miles a hove to on the wind
sounds

Thursday June 14th 1888

P.M. Working ship to the Northward
wind at N.W. at six o'clock dropped
anchor saw no whales. middle and
latter part the same

Friday June 15th 1888

P.M. Hands employed in ships duty lowered
for whales did not get any wind at
North twenty-one ships in sight
took on anchor at ten o'clock and dropped
down to the westward a short way. and
anchored again middle and latter
part the same sounds.
