Tuesday June 26 1888.

P.M. Hands employed in ship's duty - wind at North a thick fog working ship to the Northward at seven P.M. sounded bottom at 27 fathoms. middle part weather thick with light wind. at five P.M. got up on whale bone and secured it. at eleven P.M. off South Head. St Lawrence Bay sounds.

Wednesday June 27 1888.

P.M. Hands employed at washing bone weather hazy wind light from the North light winds during the night at six P.M. shut in a thick fog at eight it lifted sail a sail on the port bow. and it was the Dr Chio. Capt Allen. came onboard East Cape & the Dinards in sight. sounds.

Thursday June 28 1888.

P.M. Hands employed in drying bone and from all points of the compass at seven broke up the game four sails in sight worked to the North during middle and latter part of the day weather foggy sounds.

Friday June 29 1888

P.M. Hands employed in ship's duty - working in the Dinards at eight o'clock the Native came onboard, worked towards East Cape. wind light from the North & ship's in sight. At wake lanching whale bone. sounds

Saturday June 30 1888

P.M. of East Cape. Hands employed in lanching bone and stowing it below. at four o'clock the Native came onboard and at North nine ships in sight. middle and latter part the same ships have seen several whales even

Sunday July 1 1888

P.M. Off Cape East working to the south Hands employed in ship's duty. spoke the Stm Bohua. wind at S.W. middle part of the day layed to off the Cape latter part worked to the South. guarded the Dr Lancer. sounds

Monday July 2 1888

P.M. Hands employed in ship's duty - Ships off the Cape are whaling Natives are onboard. at seven o'clock jammed the Narkhal. Capt McGregor came onboard. at nine broke up the game middle part foggy wind at north. at night A.M. keep off with south. at nine raised a sail on port bow. sounds

Tuesday July 3 1888

P.M. Hands employed in working ship at three o'clock hove the ship to on the port tack, at seven P.M. ship's position is four miles west of the Island of Gromedes weather thick wind at north middle and latter part worked to the north four ships in sight.

Wednesday July 4 1888

P.M. Hands employed in ship's duty. working ship to the N.W. at seven P.M. hove to of Cape East Cape. one ship in sight at one A.M. keep off N.W. wind light from the South at five A.M. started to break out the after hole ship running along the ice one ship in sight sounds

Thursday July 5 1888

P.M. Hands employed in breaking out the after hole wind at south course W East heat seen some Natives at ten P.M. started sail at three A.M. Cape Thorne six miles off at six A.M. keep off for Point Hope and in sight sounds
