

Tuesday April 30th 1889

Spunkhinsk Begins with thick snowy weather with wind from the N.W. ship fast in the ice with all sail furled latter part working to the West Cape Spunkhinsk in sight bearing N distant about 18 miles

Wednesday May 1st 1889

Begins with strong breeze from the N.E. with clear weather the middle part the same latter part working to the S.E. under short sail Cape Spunkhinsk in sight bearing N.W. distant about 20 miles

Thursday May 2nd 1889

Begins with clear weather and strong breeze from the N.E. working out of the ice middle part the same latter part working to the S.E. Covered twice for whales but did not see them after we lowered Cape Spunkhinsk in sight bearing N distant about 30 miles several vessels in sight

Friday May 3rd 1889

Begins with clear weather and fresh N.E. wind working to the N.E. in the ice middle and latter part the same several vessels in sight Cape Spunkhinsk in sight bearing N by W distant about 40 miles

Saturday May 4th

Begins with strong N.W. winds with thick weather and snow squalls working to the eastward through strip ice middle and latter part the same several vessels in sight No Observations.

Sunday May 5th 1889

Begins with snow squalls and strong breeze from the N.E. working to the N.E. through strip ice middle and latter part the same several vessels in sight No Observations

Monday May 6th 1889

Begins with strong breeze from the N.E. with partially thick weather working to the N.E. through ice spoke the Eliza several vessels in sight sent the dingy out middle and latter part spoke several vessels received one boat from the Sea Breeze and one from the Bram Parker

To U.S. Tuesday May 7th 1889 Lat 60°30' Lon 178°55'

Begins with clear weather and light breeze from the N.E. working to the N.E. in the strip ice several vessels in sight middle part spoke the wandan latter part clear weather with light breeze from the N.E. cruising in the ice

Lat 60°10' Lon 178°55' Wednesday May 8th 1889

Begins with light breeze from the N to N.E. several vessels in sight spoke the Leucosticta middle part the same latter part the same

Lat 60°12' Lon 175°45' Thursday May 9th 1889

Begins with light breeze and clear weather working to the Eastward in the ice two vessels in sight middle part the same latter part thick weather with light breeze from the E. snowing but fore upper and lower topsails

Friday May 10th 1889

Begins with strong breeze from the N.E. working to the N.E. middle and latter part the same three vessels in sight

Lat 60°00' Lon 175°58' Saturday May 11th 1889

Begins with strong breeze from the N.E. middle and latter part the same three vessels in sight bent new Main top gallant sail

Lat 60°00' Lon 176°25' Sunday May 12th 1889

Begins with strong breeze from the N.E. working to the east through ice middle and latter part the same spoke the Leucosticta

Lat 59°23' Lon 179°10' Monday May 13th 1889

Begins with fresh breeze from the north with clear weather middle part the same latter part thick with snow working to the Eastward the Ohio in sight

Lat 59°30' Lon 179°30' Tuesday May 14th 1889

Begins with strong breeze from the N.E. with partially thick weather working to the Eastward middle and latter part the same three vessels in sight

Civil Time

Tuesday May 14th 1889

Begins with fresh breeze from the north with clear weather working to the eastward along the ice middle part middle and latter part the same spoke the Alexander
