

Remarks made on board *Ph. W. Baylis*

Sunday July 7th

At anchor at Point Hope several vessels and ice in sight. wind light S.E. weather clear

Monday July 8th 1889

At anchor at Point Hope wind S.E. weather clear several vessels and ice in sight

Tuesday July 9th 1889

At anchor at Point Hope wind N.E. weather clear scattering ice sent 6 barrels of Pork on board the *S. Hicks* Harry Briggs returned to duty.

Wednesday July 10

At anchor on the North side of the point at 5 P.M. went around to the south side of the point to anchor spoke the *Thomas* spoke several vessels and ice in sight Wind N.W. weather clear received 40 sacks flour 40 boxes potatoes 1 package eggs from the *J. Pope* and delivered 2 bundles of bone and letters

Thursday July 11th 1889

At anchor at Point Hope calm and light breeze from all around weather clear

Friday July 12th 1889

Went around to the north side of the point at anchor spoke the *Beak* wind S.E. weather partially clear

Saturday July 13th

At anchor at Point Hope at 7 P.M. got under weigh wind South clear weather stirring S by E.

Sunday July 14th

Thick weather anchored off Cape Dyer calm weather thick

Monday July 15th 1889

Took our anchor and worked north Cape Lisboarne bearing E. N. E. distant about 4 miles on ship and scattering ice in sight wind north weather clear

Tuesday July 16th 1889

Cape Lisboarne bearing east distant about 5 miles working north

Wednesday July 17th 1889

At anchor about 15 miles E. N. E. of Cape Lisboarne ship taking fresh water

Thursday July 18th 1889

At anchor ship taking water, wind N.E. weather clear, scattering ice and five vessels in sight

Friday July 19th 1889

At anchor, wind east, weather clear several vessels in sight finished taking water about 450 barrels, at 8 P.M. took our anchor and went about 5 miles to the N.E.

Saturday July 20th 1889

At anchor at the coal veins ship working coal in company with several other vessels weather clear, wind light and baffling

Sunday July 21st 1889

At anchor, finished working 12 boatloads of coal wind baffling weather foggy

Monday July 22nd 1889

At anchor light winds and calms several vessels in sight

Tuesday July 23rd 1889

At anchor at 7 am, took our anchor and worked N.E. at 4 P.M. anchored: Cape Beaufort bearing east distant about 5 miles

Wednesday July 24th

Working to the north several vessels in sight wind light from N.W. to N.E. weather clear Cape Beaufort in sight bearing E by S. distant about 6 miles scattering ice
