Remarks Jan 7 1867 all these 24 hours light winds
breeze SSW under short sail employed boiling
at 6 P.M. finished the whale makes 40 barrels with makes
180 since leaving port with I call closing well

Lat 36° 30' S Long 180° 00'

Jan 8 1867 these 24 hours strong Northerly wind ship
steering SSW under short sail showed down 1000 gallons of
oil in the after hatch

Lat 37° 15' S Long 178° 40' E

Ship close in to the East Cape of New Zealand

Tuesday 9 1867

all these 24 hours blowing a gale from the North with rain
breeze SSW part of the time saw the land to the westward
No oil

Thursday Jan 10 1867 most of these 24 hours calm
employed stowing down oil at 6 P.M. took a light breeze
from North steering SSE all sail set

Lat 39° 44' 0

Long 178° 35' East

hope I shall find whales before long. If I don't I shall start
for Cape Horn

Remarks Friday Jan 11 1867 most of these 24 hours
fresh breeze from the Northward breeze SE by compass
with pleasant weather

Lat 41° 41' South

Long 177° 15' East

Remarks Saturday Jan 12 1867

most of these 24 hours strong southerly wind steering
E by N by compass have started for Cape Horn hope I shall
have a good run I want to get home as quick as possible

Lat by obs 42° 19' 0

Long 178° 20' W

from that position
I take my departure

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Remarks Sunday Jan 13 1867

all these 24 hours light baffling winds ship working to the
Southward I don't like head winds

Lat 42° 08' S Long 165° 50' E

Remarks Jan 14 1867

all these 24 hours light Northerly wind steering to the Southward
at 12 A.M. passed Chatham Island

Lat 43° 45' 0 Long 176° 06' E

Now for Cape Horn and home as fast as good wind will take
me Not doing much at present wind very light but
better than wind perhaps we will make 120 miles towards home
small part of 10 thousands

Remarks Wednesday 16 1867

most of these 24 hours strong southerly wind with
ship heading East by the wind all sail set at 4 P.M.
took in the forehatch boats

Lat 44° 05' 0 Long 179° 00' W so good night

Remarks Thursday Jan 17 1867

most of these 24 hours fresh SE winds ship heading E. N. E.
most of the time hope the wind will haul to the S. W. I don't
like head winds when I am bound home

Lat 44° 30' S Long 169° 15' West

A heavy sea running from S. W. saw nothing but birds
them mostly albatross No more to sight

Remarks Friday Jan 18 1867

most of these 24 hours light SE wind with heavy swell from the S. S. E.
steering E. by S all sail saw some kelp I think this must be a
strongly likely went for help to get here the nearest land is 400
miles distant to the westward

Lat 44° 54' 0 Long 166° 00' E

Remarks Saturday Jan 19 1867

all these 24 hours strong S. W. wind with pleasant weather steering
East by compass all sail set

Lat by obs 45° 40' 0

Long 163° 06' E
