

Remarks on Board Bark *Seahorse* of New Bedford
 Sunday Jan 19th

This day opens with a light breeze from the S.E. steering by it on the port tack at daylight made sail and kept off to N.W. about 1 o'clock. Saw the lighter boats soon after saw plenty of seals and humpbacks lowered four boats about 3 o'clock. One Master struck a calf. One blacksmith passed him his pump and his son then went in the boat and helped get his son in the large whale and his son with a iron while there but put an iron in the nose whale but it broke off soon after. One Martin got his boat stove and came on board about sunset.
 Lat 24-38 N Long 14-15 E. It ends this day

Monday Jan 17

This day opens with a light breeze from the S. steering by it on the port tack at 2 o'clock. We went around heading in shore at day light made sail had a thick fog until about 11 o'clock. Towed down 5th boat caught 2 of them. Saw humpbacks and the land saw a schooner at anchor about 12 o'clock she made sail and steamed to the S. At one o'clock I saw a good breeze from the S. and kept off shore steering N.W. at sunset shortened sail. Shorted the masts and hauled with the blackfish.

Tuesday Jan 18th

This day opens with a good breeze from the S.W. steering by it on the port tack heading N.W. Took the seven boat in and put her on the horse and put the new one and some spikes for spars at sunset shortened sail and came to the ground on the port tack heading N.
 Lat 24-10 N Long 12-14 E. It ends this day

Robinson's Quarter. Fairing

Wednesday Jan 19th

This day opens with a good breeze from the S.W. steering by it on the port tack at one o'clock. Made sail and kept off to N.W. while employed in ship's duty. At sunset shortened sail and came to the wind in the Western tack for spars in sight.
 Lat 23-54 N Long 10-41 E. It ends this day

Thursday Jan 20th

This day opens with a strong breeze from the S. steering by it on the port tack heading N.W. At daylight kept N.W. sunset reefed topsails about 8 o'clock. At daybreak one of the board jacks saw a sperm whale going to the south. 3 boats for them chased one whale & sighting there he started to the windward quick. Capt. lowered for him but could not get ahead of him. There was two more whales in sight but going to the windward quick. Boats came along side about 12 o'clock and then took the reef out of the topsails & lowered gibs & spars and worked to the windward at sunset reefed topsails and stood on the Western tack until 12 o'clock.
 Lat 23-00 N Long 10-00 E. It ends this day
