 as yesterday latter part light winds
 from the N.W. steering N.E. by E.
 Lat 26.27 Lon 145.12

Remarks on Wednesday the 5th
 These 24 hours light winds from the South
 spoke the Armata of New London Capt Holt
 Lat 26.37 Lon 145.22

Remarks on Thursday the 6th
 First part of these 24 hours light winds from
 the S and Westward at 3 P.M. changed to the N
 so cold this day Lat 27.27 Lon 145.55

Remarks on Friday the 7th
 First part strong breeze from the E.N.E.
 steering N.N.E. latter part a sweet S.E. Easter
 Lat 28.59 Lon 146.03

Remarks on Saturday the 8th
 First and middle parts strong gales with
 rain latter part strong breeze clear weather
 the wind from the N.W. ship heading
 N.W. so cold this day
 Lat 30.01 Lon 146.08

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Remarks on Sunday April the 9th
 These 24 hours light winds from N.E. to
 E. ship heading by the wind under all
 sail so cold this day Lat 31.03 Lon 145.55

Remarks on Monday the 10th
 These 24 hours strong wind from the S.E.
 Lat 32.47 Lon 148.39

Remarks on Tuesday the 11th
 These 24 hours began with a strong breeze from
 the E. and cold with a heavy gale from the
 N.E. Lat 33.50 Lon 148.04

 These 24 hours light air from the S.E. by E.
 Lat 35.39 Lon 150.10

 These 24 hours a dirty Easter

 These 24 hours a heavy gale from the Northward
