 and thick fog the most of the time saw a ship
 No observation

Remarks on Friday the 25th
 These 24 hours a gale from the Westward
 clear weather steering N.W. by N first part
 latter part steering N.W. Lat 45.22 Lon 159.45

Remarks on Saturday the 26th
 These 24 hours a heavy gale from the
 Westward snow flying on ice making
 Lat 46.41 Lon 161.08

Remarks on Tuesday the 29th
 First part of these 24 hours a gale from the Eastward
 and a snow storm latter part a strong breeze from
 the Northward Lat 49.32 Lon 162.34

Remarks on Wednesday the 30th
 These 24 hours a light breeze from the Northward and
 very good weather for the time of year in these latitudes
 ship heading to the N and E ends this day
 Lat 49.55 Lon 162.57

Remarks on Thursday May the 1st
 These 24 hours light winds from the Northward with
 some snow so on and so ends Lat 50.07

Remarks on Friday the 2nd
 These 24 hours light air from the N.W. with frequent light
 snow squalls ship heading N.W. saw a ship
 Lat 50.40 Lon 163.24
