

Ship George 1844 Oct

Sat Day 12<sup>th</sup> Begins with strong breezes from SSE Course E at 3 Pm Keel  
down the top sails at 4 Pm wind  
haul to S by N Course E by S  
Latter part strong gales from  
SSE 11<sup>th</sup> 3<sup>rd</sup> E Smith Sick off duty  
Lat by obs 30° 04' S Long 151° 17' W

Sun Day 13<sup>th</sup> Through the day strong breezes  
and unpleasant weather wind  
from WSE Course E by S  
Compass at Lat 30° 9' Long 167° 54' E

Mon Day 14<sup>th</sup> Begins with strong breezes and  
unpleasant weather latter part  
moderate breezes and pleasant  
weather and no whales Lat 30° 10' S  
No obs to day Long 164° 48' by Chron

Tue Day 15<sup>th</sup> Begins with Calm and rain  
at 4 Pm unhooked the fore topmast  
stay sail to be repaired and at 6 Pm  
hooked it latter part Calm and a  
heavy sea running the Stopped  
work employed setting up the  
main rigging Lat 30° 21' Long 164° 24'

Wed Day 16<sup>th</sup> Begins with light breezes from  
SE at 1 Pm strong breezes from  
SSE steering by the wind ESE  
latter part wind haul to  
SSE and blew heavy at 10  
Pm Course Keel the top sails  
and furled the mainsail and at  
1 Pm took in the fore and main  
top sails and furled the fore sail  
and at 6 furled the main top sail  
and in the morning very heavy  
Lat by obs 30° 42' S

Th Day 17<sup>th</sup> Begins with strong gales  
from SSW weather unpleasant  
at 1 Pm made sail ship heading  
East by S latter part the same  
Lat 30° 04' Long 161° 24' E

Fri Day 18<sup>th</sup> first part of the day lower to be  
breezes from South & ship heading  
E by S all hands employed in  
repairing the gill Smith Remains  
Sick off duty gale mowed the  
same latter part strong  
breezes from S & ship heading to  
SE Lat 30° 44' Long 159° 24' West

Sat Day 19<sup>th</sup> Through the day strong breezes  
from SSE ship heading to SE  
Lat 30° 24' S Long 158° 11' W

Sun Day 20<sup>th</sup> Begins with strong breezes from  
ESE ship heading to the SSE  
at 2 Pm saw a sail to  
the southward latter part  
saw the same sail Lat 29° 09'  
Lat 29° 05' Long 158° 34' W

Mon Day 21<sup>st</sup> Begins with strong breezes  
and cloudy weather at 1 Pm  
hooked a ~~small~~ 20 handed mainsail  
the sail that was seen the  
morning 12 miles 1 Point on our  
weather how is now 2 on our  
bow she appeared to be the  
17<sup>th</sup> of May of 1844 8 m seen  
at 3 Pm saw another sail to the  
westward latter part passed  
both ship and left them a stern  
out of sight gale mowed  
if getting worse Smith is a  
hoyt the same Lat 29° 35'  
Long 158° 29' West from Greenwich
