

New Bedford March 19. 1852
In pursuance of a warrant issued to the undersigned
by William H. Taylor Esq a Notary Public to appear
on board the Schooner Mission of New Bedford from
Haverhill to survey the stowage of her cargo
and for other purposes.

Dominoschitz

That on this day
went on board the said Schooner and found her
between decks partly discharged, and on the
Starboard side we found some barrels of
Whalebone damaged when it lay against the
side of the vessel and without any dunnage
to keep it off. We found dunnage upon the deck
and in sufficient quantity.

March 20. 1852.

Was called upon again to go on
board the said Schooner to look at the stowage and found
more Whalebone damaged by lying against the
ceiling of the between decks and found no dunnage
between it and the Whalebone. The Air Stove
was open and the side of the vessel quite wet.

It appeared to us, and in our opinion
there should have been dunnage placed between
the cargo and the side of the vessel.

On this twenty fourth day of March
in the year of our Lord One thousand eight
hundred and fifty two, before me William
H. Taylor a Notary Public duly commissioned
and sworn, residing in the City of New Bedford
appeared, personally appeared Jacob Berry
Master of the Schooner of Cheever of Dennis
of the parish of one hundred seventy three
\$44/25 say a thousand and seventy three
he being from Boston in said Schooner on
the 19 day of March instant having on
board a cargo consisting of dressed bones
for Philadelphia and having struck a
rock off Point Quinman, causing the
Schooner to leak, was compelled to beach
for New Bedford and in running for the
harbor of New Bedford, at about 8 o'clock
on the evening of the 22nd inst, run upon
Egg Island in the mouth of the harbor
where she now lies, notwithstanding all
the efforts he has been able to make to get
her about, and apprehending loss and
damage desired to note his protest against
the winds waves, tides, currents, breaking
rocks and all other causes whereby the
said Schooner hath suffered or sustained
loss or damage in her hull, tackle, apparel
furniture or cargo, with liberty to extend
