Remarks Sunday December the 15th 1907

P.m. Strong southerly wind and clear weather
at 1.30 Short her down to the lower topsails
let her lay on starboard the tack saw two
vessel bound South. end of day
Fat 35.50 Ton: 50.27

Remarks Monday December the 16th 1907

P.m. light breeze and fine clear weather
Wind from Westward all sail set. Standen
to the Southward. Watch employed plating boom
and setting gib stay. we down our vessel.
and school of groups end of day 49.41
Fat 36.20 Ton: 49.41

Remarks Tuesday December the 17th 1907

P.m. light breeze and clear weather
Wind from eastward course N. at 7 P.m.
hoisted all the light sails watch employed
painting the house and brake out bread
end of day. Fat 37.40 Ton: 50.26

Remarks Wednesday December the 18th 1907

P.m. light breeze and cloudy weather wind
from S. all sails set running to the Northward
at 7 P.m. Janis saw a large sperm whale
and we Short her down to the lower topsail
heave her to on port tack and we got
one fopail. Sun obscure end of day.
