

From Havana for New Orleans.

Thursday March 22^d 1832 Commenced fine weather and quite breeze from N. E. At 6 A.M. hove the anchor up and made all sail for the S. W. Pass. At 11 A.M. anchored in 9 fathoms the New Light House bearing at the north bearing North 3 miles distant. Latter part of the day calm. In the afternoon went on board Ship Ranger of Buckport (Me) Capt. Snow, who arrived last night 40 days from Havana. Friday March 23^d Commenced calm. At 6 A.M. the Steam Boat Pocahontas came down with Dring Samuel & John of Boston and Aquila of Portsmouth. After bringing them over the bar, she took on the Ship Augustus of Boston & at 2 and took the Palma the Sch. Eagle of Portland and a Mexican Schooner. At 10 past 10 A.M. having the afore-mentioned vessels in the Ship & Sch. Eagle lashed each side and the Sch. & the Mexican in tow proceeded under all steam up the Mississippi for New Orleans. At 11 A.M. discharged the Pilot. Land and the Revenue boat boarded us and examined Manifest &c. At 1 P.M. being moderate breeze from E. S. E. the vessels set all drawing daily. Continuing light breeze, being towed at the rate of 4 to 5 knots by the land, by Steam. The Capt. of Sch. Eagle and a young man by the name of Townsend of Boston Supercargo of the Ship dropped astern from the Sch. with her boat and came on board being too dangerous to return remained on board the night.

Saturday March 24th First part light air and calm and very much annoyed with Mosquitoes & Sand Flies in abundance. At 8 A.M. off Grand Point. At Meridian off Johnson's Plantation and passed White Ocean of New York at anchor there.

Sunday March 25th Still on the tow line. The Steam boat until 11 A.M. when we were cast adrift and hauled in at the foot of Conti Street wharf after finding that my brother William was in the place called upon him and also I met with Mr. Josiah Saxton an old friend, who resided with Mr. John C. M. I saw another old friend.

At New Orleans

Monday March 26th 1832. Fair morning took my things to the Mr. the Lord kept by Mr. West Caldwell City. Saw nothing worthy of attention in or on land and consequently.

Tuesday March 27th At Leguane and fair warm weather. Found many here, as also many other acquaintances I have felt in with in my travels.

Wednesday March 28th Fair weather.

Have made several applications for none that suits my expectations or

Thursday March 29th Fair weather to be seen nothing of remark, excepting which, I may say I never saw equal.

Friday March 30th Fair weather upon any thing. Nothing offering to even for me to do for want of a

Saturday March 31st Nothing remarkable gentlemen (passing) the time

Sunday April 1st 1832 A fair difference in the breeze & noise for

Monday April 2nd Fair weather. Capt. Currier who came out in

Capt. Reed. I also saw yesterday Capt. Nathl. Bishop of Providence who sailed the same day that I did for Newport, bound here in Ship Bonulus. Capt. K. M. M.

Tuesday April 3rd Saw my Brother William this day, who thinks of returning home soon. Saw Capt. Downough of New London a fellow passenger from the Havana and went with him to his lodgings in the evening.

Wednesday April 4th Squally weather with rain. Visited but little this day. Capt. Davis whom I came with from Havana requested me to go with him to Tabasco & from thence to New York but all I would receive would be the time.
