

76 Tuesday 13th October
Commences with fresh winds from the N course S by W under the main sail to repair middle and latter part, pleasant all sail set
Lat 34° 24' Long 17° 05'

77 Wednesday 14th
Begins with light winds from the NNE and fine weather saw a fin back part, the main sail set a school of killer's struck killed and sunk a humpback
Lat 33° 35' Long 17° 01'

78 Thursday 15th
Light winds from the NW 4th course S middle part, squally took in topgall sails latter part, made sail saw humpbacks
Lat 34° 52' Long 16° 47'

79 Friday 16th
Begins with light winds from the North saw gulls, numbers birds at 7 PM wind hauled to the S E took in light sails middle part, wind increased double reefed the topsails took in the mainsail jib and foresaker latter part, strong gales Lat 34° 38' Long 15° 02'

80 Saturday 17th
Strong gales from the S E heading to the Eastward at 3 PM set the main sail and jib unbent the spangars and bent the close mizen, thick and squally middle part, moderate made sail, found one of the fore top mast crosspieces broke fitted another tacked to the S W saw a fin back
Lat 34° 23' Long 14° 08'

81 Sunday 18th
Begins with light winds from the S E and fine weather middle part, made saw several fin backs and numbers birds
Lat 36° 10' Long 14° 35'

82 Monday 19th October
Light part, light winds from the N E at 2 PM saw a right whale lowered the boat could not get fast at 8 took in the topsails squally part, moderate made sail latter part, light winds and cloudy saw a whale could not catch him
Lat 35° 06'

83 Tuesday 20th
Light winds from the N E and cloudy standing S E mid part, made Lat 35° 06' made Enaccessable Island bearing E by N Dist 25 miles at 8 sent in 2 boats light winds from the N E saw whales chased them one ship in sight, Lat

84 Wednesday 21st
Begins with light winds from the N E at 6 PM the boat returned to the ship had chased whales middle part, squally at 11 stood in for the land latter part, strong winds double reefed the topsails the land off the weather

85 Thursday 22nd
Begins with strong winds from the N E ship under double reefed topsails saw 2 ships standing up for the land stood off and on during the night latter part, heavy squalls close reefed the topsails at 11 PM Nightingale off the beam & aside dist

86 Friday 23rd
Commences with strong winds from the N E standing S middle part, squally latter part, more moderate standing out, reefs and set the main top gail ends with thick and rainy weather

87 Saturday 24th
Begins with light winds from the S W course S E saw a whale going quick to the N E at dark up the watch boat, crews mid part, thick latter part, pleasant, employed in mending sails Lat 36° 08' S Long 12° 50' W
