

216 Tuesday 1st March 1836
Commenced light winds from SE
and pleasant, all sail set, steering
N^W middle and latter part wind
and weather much the same
Lat, 21°49' N Long 20°13' W

217 Wednesday 2nd
First part of this 24 hours light breeze
at 3 PM shifted studding sail course N
mid part wind very light, latter
part squally with rain Lat, 1°46' Long 20°42'

218 Thursday 3rd
Light winds from NW and rainy
weather PM lowered for blackfish
mid and latter part squalls and
rain Lat, 1°00'

219 Friday 4th
Began with light winds from E and
rain chased blackfish mid
and latter part squally took in top
gallant sails Lat, 1°00'

220 Saturday 5th
Commenced with fresh winds
from NE set top gallant sail saw a sail
steering SE saw a school of black
fish mid part wind light latter
part variable Lat, 00°12' N Long 22°08' W

221 Sunday 6th
Began with light winds and squalls
heading westward mid and latter
part light breezes from NE
Lat, 22 miles N Long 23°29'

222 Monday 7th
First part moderate winds
from NE mid part fresh breeze
latter part wind light and weather
pleasant Lat, 1°32' Long 23°42'

223 Tuesday 8th
Commenced with broad winds from
NE and pleasant, unbent the fore
top sail and bent it again caught a
porpoise mid and latter part
fresh winds and pleasant
Lat, 2°54' N Long 27°44' W

224 Wednesday 9th
Commenced with fresh winds from
NE and pleasant course N^W by N
mid part squally latter part
fresh winds and fine weather
Lat, 4°36' Long 29°50'

225 Thursday 10th
Began with strong winds from
NE mid and latter part wind
and weather about the same all
sail set, to the best advantage
Lat, 6°30' Long 32°08'

226 Friday 11th
First part strong trades and
fine weather mid part wind
increasing took in the M³ sail
latter part fresh winds and fine
weather Lat, 8°39' Long 33°52'

227 Saturday 12th
Commenced with fresh winds
and cloudy took in fore top of sail
mid and latter part no alter
ation Lat, 10°41' Long 36°20'

228 Sunday 13th
Began with fresh winds and rough
sea PM reefed the top sails mid
part squally PM turned out reefs
Lat, 12°52' Long 38°27'

229 Monday 14th
Strong winds from NE and rough
sea at 4 PM saw a school of sperm
whales drove boats struck and killed
two men a line from one to the ship
was put and lost him at 9 the boats
left the other being so rough could
not too double reefed the top sails
and beat to windward during the
night in search of the whales, at
10 kept off N^W and made sail
Lat, 13°19' Long 39°11' W
