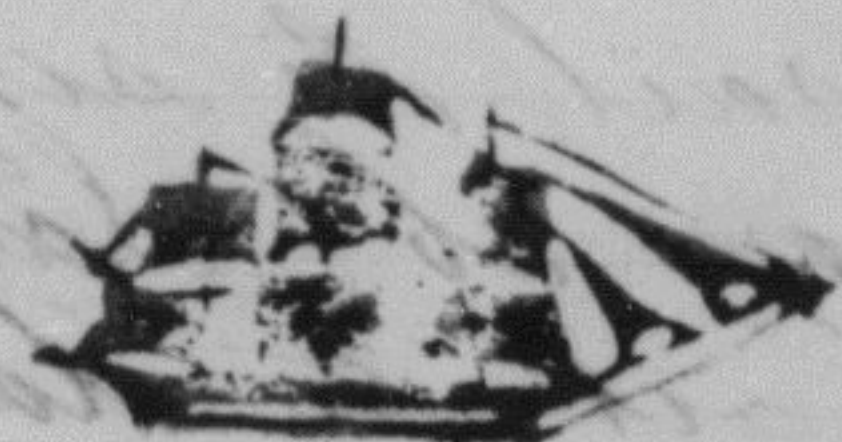
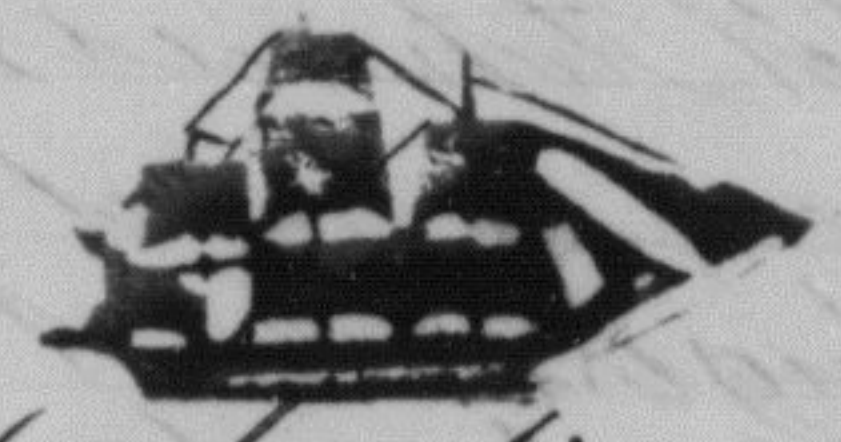


Journal of H. M. King kept on board ship

to stand off and on until 10:11

if the consul gets it, he is to set 2 Signals

Wednesday July 8 1841
A stiff breeze from the Eastward stood
off and on last night between Peru and
Royal at 10:11 ran down to the town of
Royal and saw 2 signals set as was agreed
upon if the Consul got his Rocket Boat
sent the Boat on shore and got his papers
hitching them stowed under the Consul's
gate we then beat out from between Royal
and Rico and then kept her on the



wind heading NNE saw 2 sails
1 of them the Barque Leader of Westport
at Boiling out

Thursday July 9 1841
A light breeze from the Eastward Cruising
off St. George saw nothing but 2 sails
at 4 p.m. we caught the topsails
and hauled up the courses
and then started this morning



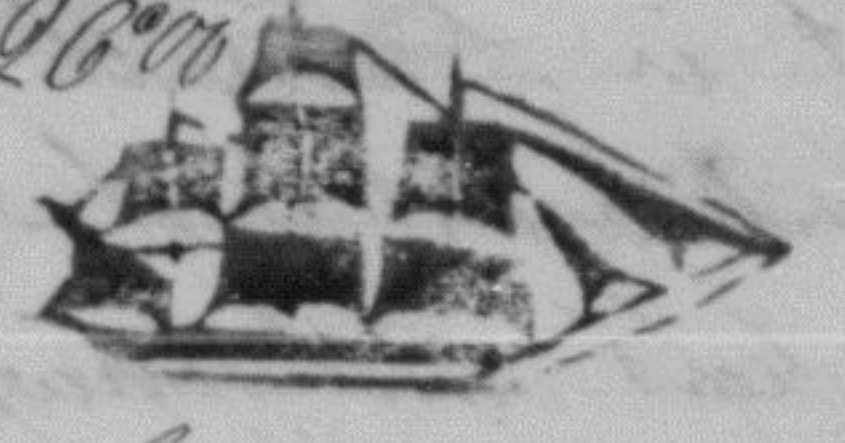

this morning and took it in again at night
A man sick with the Dore and Ague and Cets

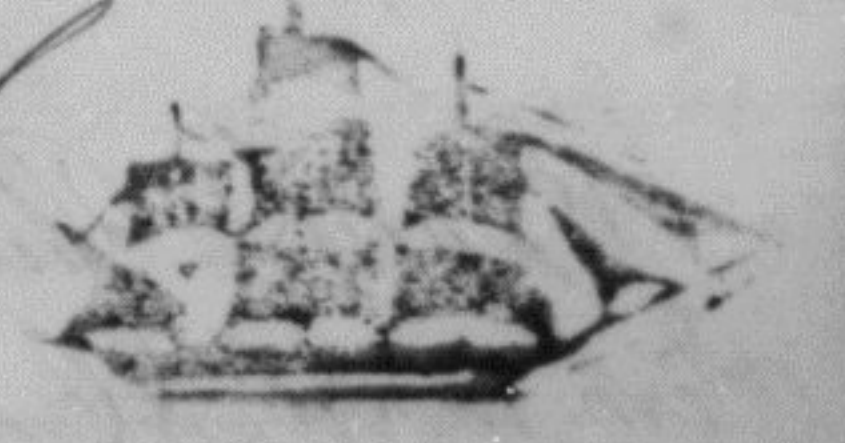
Saturday July 11 1841
A light breeze from the ENE cruising off Percer saw 2 ships
and got one made sail this morning and took it in again at night

Sunday July 11 1841
A light breeze from the ENE cruising off Percer made
sail this morning and took it in again at night
Saw a break in the weather and called it a
Whaler but saw it no more Saw Grampuses and Porpoise
Saw a Portuguese Schooner standing to the westward
Percer

Monday July 12 1841
A moderate breeze from the NE by E with the
Main Yard black last night and at daylight this morn-
ing kept her off S by E and made all sail at 10 kept
her S by E until 11:00 to day saw a sail
Lat 32° 15' Long 26° 00'



Tuesday July 13 1841
A stiff breeze from the NE steering South under
all sail bent the Thomas Cluttings sail
and set it Percer started Schooner
Lat 32° 23' Long 25° 50'



Wednesday July 14 1841
A stiff breeze from the NE steering S by W
until 4 p.m. when we kept her South under all sail
bent the main yard and mast Lat 32° 00' Long 26° 00'
