1898

their 24 hours commences with strong winds
from the S.W. and some squally
nothing seen of our middle part. Strong winds
from the Eastward latter part squally weather
and fogged saw a merchant ship to the south
So ends their 24 hours
Lat also 17.43 S long is 36.15

Monday
December
the 31
1898

their 24 hours commences with strong winds from
the Eastward at 2 P.M. saw a sperm whale
heard the boats and heard the sunset and could
not get past the bridge and saw a shark in
the middle part gentle breeze from the
Eastward latter part the same at 6 A.M.
saw whales heard but could not get past
at 12 o'clock some fog heard no land
Lat also 18.14 S long is 36.43

Tuesday
January
the 1
1899

their 24 hours commences with gentle breeze
from the Eastward some squalls again
middle part light winds and pleasant weather
latter part the same two sails in sight
So ends their 24 hours
Lat also 18.29 S long is 37.15.20

Wednesday
January
the 2
1899

their 24 hours commences with light winds
from the South and Eastward two sails in
middle part gentle breeze from the South and
Eastward latter part the same nothing in
sight of the day so ends their 24 hours
Lat also 18.35 S long is 37.16.15

Thursday
January
the 3
1899

their 24 hours commences with gentle breeze
from the South and Eastward nothing in sight of our
middle part gentle breeze from the South and
Eastward latter part the same three
sails in sight of the day
So ends their 24 hours
Lat also 18.25 S long is 37.41
