these 24 hours commences with strong winds from the westward and ragged weather nothing in site of us middle part strong winds from the westward and ragged weather latter part the same nothing in site so ends these 24 hours

Wednesday
July the 15
1840
at 34.28
45.45
these 24 hours commences with strong wind from the north and westward nothing in site of us to day middle part lite winds from the north and westward and pleasant weather latter part the same saw nothing dark and dim and nothing to be seen so ends these 24 hours

Thursday
July the 16
1840
at 34.58
45.27
these 24 hours commences with lite wind from the north west and pleasant at 4 pm saw kilas bound the boats but could not get past the bars middle part lite winds from the north and westward and pleasant weather latter part the same nothing in site so ends these 24 hours

Friday
July the 17
1840
at 45.20
these 24 commences with lite wind from the westward and some squalls at 5 pm spoke the brig Chase of Rochester Capt Mayhew middle part lite winds from the westward and some squalls of rain latter part the same at 11 am spoke the brig Elizabeth of westport Capt Cook so ends these 24 hours

Saturday
July the 18
1840
at 35.06
45.07
these 24 hours commences with lite winds from the south and westward and squally weather in the sail in site middle part lite winds from the south latter part the same nothing in site of us so ends these 24 hours

Sunday
July the 19
1840
at 35.28
44.48
the 24 hours commences with lite winds from the south and pleasant weather nothing in site of us middle part lite winds from the south latter part the same saw three sails pleasant weather so ends these 24 hours
