Tuesday Aug 20th

All these 24 hours moderate winds from the WSW steering S & by Compass 2 points variation thick foggy weather saw one white Whale lowered for him but without success saw several white fin back Whales employed in cleaning bone so ends this day No Oil

Wednesday Aug 21st

All these 24 hours strong southerly winds and thick foggy weather steering on A Wind to the Southward and Eastward saw nothing this day employed in cleaning bone so ends No Oil

Thursday Aug 22nd

All these 24 hours strong winds from the W and thick foggy weather with fine rain steering on A wind to the South and East so ends this day nothing in sight Lat 46° 52' 01" North

Friday Aug 23rd

First part of this day fine moderate weather steering to the South and East on A Wind at 3 P.M. lowered for A white Whale went on to him and the boatster missed him took up the boats and kept of for ~~him~~ ^{him} ~~two~~ ^{two} ~~more~~ ^{more} lowered for them have two irons in to them with Drees but they started and one iron broke the whale went of a firing kept of for a ship to the leeward but did not speak for day at back for the night middle and latter parts foggy at 10 O.M. spoke the Currier of New Bedford 22 months out with 600 sperm and 150 Whale so ends this day wind from the WSW Lat 46° 51' 16" North

Saturday Aug 24th

All these 24 hours fresh southerly winds and foggy weather heading to the South and East in company with the Currier of New Bedford and New England of New London got two tow lines out of the New England sold to the Currier of New Bedford at eleven o'clock saw no Whales this day but fin backs so ends

Sunday Aug 25th

All these 24 hours fresh winds from the Southward heading to South and East on A wind the ship New England of New London in sight foggy till 11 o'clock through the 24 hours off ends this day nothing in shape of Whales Lat 48° 33' 00" North
Long 142° 25' West

Monday Aug 26th

All these 24 hours strong southerly winds heading to the Eastward on A wind for squalls and fine rain at times at 4 A.M. tacked ship to the Westward saw a dead Whale and two fin back Whales so ends this day sent A new fore topsail. Lat 48° 55' North

Tuesday Aug 27th

These 24 hours commenced with strong winds from the Southward Doubled Reaped the fore topsail and Singled Reaped the main heading to the Westward middle part strong winds Double Reaped the main topsail latter part more moderate took out one reef out of back topsail employed in repairing the fore topsail so ends this day heading North nothing in sight this day Lat 48° 33' 00" North
Long 147° 39' West
