

Pinnants on board Monday 10th April 1843

Commenced with light winds from S.E. steering under all sail to the light. Sun down shortened sail and wore to S by the middle point. Same latter part made all sail steering S.E. so ends
Lat. 10.18.

Tuesday 11th

Commenced with strong breeze from S.E. under close reef topsails. Sun down wore to S by the middle point. Same latter part made all sail steering S.W. 8. All strong squalls shortened sail to close reef topsails & foresail so ends

Lat. 10.0

Wednesday 12th

Commenced with moderate winds from S.E. in a wind to S.E. under all sail. Sun down shortened sail & set the outer Boats down. Middle point the same latter part made all sail steering S.W. by W. so ends
Lat. 11.2
Long 13.26

Thursday 13th

Commenced with light winds from S.E. by S. under all sail to S.W. Sun down shortened sail to single reef topsails & foresails. Middle point same. Latter part same. 9. A.M. Brig struck on Cape Delgado 9 feet water. 10. A.M. cut away fore top Mast & try to get her off without effect. 4. P.M. all hands left her in 3 Boats 1/2 each & landed on

Friday 14th

Commenced foggy with heavy rain. came to the shore with 2 Boats 4. P.M. high tide. got her off and steamed. The vessel & steered S.E. with all hands on Boards with 2 feet of water in the hold. at 10 o'clock the gunboat on middle of latter part heading to the S.E. at 5. A.M. were ship to the N.W. at 6. & 10 in lists of the Cape at 1/2 past 6 the boat & several more took

there Boats for water on shore after there 2 boats with 1/2 ton each at 1/2 in set the signal for them to return as it looks equally but they did not but kept on as to save them of the point from mast head at a squall 1/2 of the Cape Delgado Dist 15 miles

Saturday 15th

Commenced with light hazy winds with a strong strong current setting to the S.W. at 1 P.M. headed west at 2 headed to the N.E. to the S.W. at the N.E. but no boat in sight. at 7 set the light middle part. Saw nothing of them latter part the same. 8. A.M. thick squally weather with heavy rain at 10 lost the ship with strong gales & heavy squalls at 11 more moderate gales an Abolade found the brig 30 miles to the N.W. after heading all night to N.E. to Port

Sunday 16th

Commenced with strong gales from the N.E. with a strong heavy swell setting or running to the S.W. under short sail heading to the S.E. to keep of the land & reefs we have now left 11 of our foremast being in the hands of gods & 2 of us left in board with a leaking vessel with the sides on being & the fore topmast gone & all the spars & rails with it but still have hopes of reaching, ranular as that is the most part middle of latter part thick Rainy weather with heavy squalls at 1/2 past 6. with a heavy swell to the N.W. at 10. with the Brig Leaking 200 strokes a minute & at gunning & the Reader on being beating a gun to the shore
