First Part of the 24 hours Commences with Gentle breezes from the E by S. Ship heading on a Wind to the N.W. under all sail, Middle & latter Part light Winds from the E.S.E. & Squally Steering the Ship N.E. by N under all sail to ends these 24 hours Employed in Ship's Duty

Remarks On Board Thursday March 21st 1839

First Part of the 24 hours Commences with Gentle Breezes from the E.S.E. & squally of rain Steering N.E. by N Middle & latter Part Gentle Breezes from the E.S.E. & Pleasant Weather Steering Ship N.E. by N under all sail to ends these 24 hours Employed in Ship's Duty,

Remarks On Board Friday March 22nd 1839

First Part of the 24 hours Commences with Gentle Breezes from the E.S.E. & Pleasant Weather Steering the Ship N.E. by E under all sail, Middle Part Fresh Breezes & Pleasant weather at 10 AM I saw the Isle of France Bearing N.N.W. 40 miles Distance latter Part Gentle Breezes from the E.S.E. & Pleasant Weather Steering Ship North under all sail to ends these 24 hours Employed in Ship's Duty in hauling our Cables &c

Remarks On Board Saturday March 23rd 1839

First Part of the 24 hours Commences with Gentle Breezes from the E.S.E. & Pleasant Weather Steering North at 6 AM took in the main sail & main top Gallant sail & let the Ship come to on a wind heading off shore at 7 AM Round Island bearing N by W Distance 18 miles Middle Part light winds & Squally Ship off and on at Round Island at 6 AM saw a School of Sperm Whales heard the Roar's Standard boat fastened to me killed the Whale & took it along side of the Ship at 9 AM & commenced Butchering on the Whale at noon finished Butchering latter Part Gentle Breezes from the E.S.E. Steering the towards the Port of Louis under all sail to ends these 24 hours,



Remarks On Board Sunday March 24th 1839

First Part of the 24 hours Commences with Gentle Breezes from the E.S.E. & Pleasant Weather Steering the Ship along with the land at 6 AM came to an anchor off Port Louis at the Ball Bay, & pulled the Ship Middle Part light wind and fine weather at 10 AM commenced sailing out our Boiler latter Part light wind & variable Ship lying at anchor of the Ball Bay to ends these 24 hours Employed in boiling,
