

Monday February 14 1847
 Commenced with heavy Gale from the
 Northward steering S by W. At sundown
 commenced shortening sail At 11 P.M.
 bore two under double reefed topsails
 Blowing heavy in squalls took in the foretop
 At 1 P.M. kept off S by W under short
 sail At 3 P.M. made Staten Land
 Bearing S by W Distance 15 miles
 At 12 M. past the island At the rate of
 16 miles I hear saw plenty of birds
 and one whale supposed to be a right
 whale thick weather Later part the wind
 shifted to the S.S.W. Cape Horn is hard by
 16 miles Another about 16 miles westward
 16 16 1/2

Tuesday 15
 Clear night this 24 hours streaming breeze
 Calms from all parts of the compass
 Land in sight supposed to be Cape Horn
 Bearing West Distance 40 miles
 Lat by Obs 55° 52' S
 Long by Chron 64° 41' W

Wednesday 16
 Breeze in with light breeze from the
 Northward steering N.S.W. Middle
 part Calms Cape Horn bearing
 West distance 20 miles Later part
 light breeze from the S.W.
 sail pleasant Lat by Obs 56° 06'

Thursday 17
 All this 24 hours streaming
 Gales from the S.W. Laying off
 Road on Cape Horn

Thursday February 18
 All this 24 hours heavy Gale from the S.W.
 Laying two under short sail heavy squalls

Friday 19
 All this 24 hours heavy Gale from the
 S.W. and heavy squalls Laying two under
 short sail

Saturday 20
 Breeze in with heavy Gale from
 the S.W. Middle part Calms with
 a heavy swell Later part wind to
 the Eastward steering N.S.W.
 the dangers in light distance 45 miles
 Good Land seen as at this
 Lat by Obs 56° 55' S

Sunday 21
 Breeze in with light breeze from the
 N.W. steering N.S.W. Middle part wind
 shifted to the south with squalls At
 1 P.M. saw four whales but to
 the purpose saw one ship the Captain
 came on board and dined
 At sundown saw the Land in sight
 to Cape with squalls

Monday 22
 Breeze in with heavy squalls from the
 S.W. steering on my track to Cape the
 Land could not be seen the loss of
 your head so Ends Lat by Obs 56° 12' S
