

Remark. On Board of Ship Bowditch of Marion A.

Saturday November the 3^d 1849
these twenty four hours commence with a light breeze from the S.S.E. and the weather warm and pleasant, ship heading S.W., the middle part baffling air, from 2 P.M. until 5 calm, at 5 a light breeze from the S.S.E. ship heading South and S by W, five sail in sight and nothing of the Whale
Lat by Obs 5.16. N. Long by Chron 21.57

Sunday November the 4th
Commences with a light breeze from the S.S.E. and fine weather ship under all sail standing to the South, at 12 M. a fine breeze from the East, and set the larboard fore top mast standing sail, course S.W. at 10 P.M. the wind baffling and squally took in the standing sail and with a light breeze from the S.S.E. and fine weather ship by the wind heading South, six sail in sight
Lat by Obs 5.14 North Long by Chron 21.29, variation of the compass 12 West

Monday the 5th of November 1849
Commences with light breeze from the S.S.E. with squally appearances ship with all drawing sail set by the wind heading South, at 2 P.M. had a squall from the S.E. and furled the flying jib and closed down the top gallant sails, at 4 hoisted the top gallant sails heading S.W., through the night baffling and squally with rain the latter part a light breeze from the S.S.E. ship heading S.W., at 10 P.M. signalled an American Whaling Barge, and a Merchant Ship standing S.W.
Lat by Obs 4.27 Long by Act 21.55

Tuesday the 6th of November
the first of these twenty four hours squally from the S.S.E. attended with heavy showers of rain, from 6 P.M. until 2 P.M. light breezes from the S.S.E. with some rain ship heading South, at 3 P.M. a heavy squall from the East closed top gallant sails and top sails and went through it the latter part light baffling breezes from the S.E. and S.S.E. with occasional squalls of rain the ship of yesterday in sight has lost his main top mast by the squall last night four sail in sight from aloft, and no Whales

Wednesday the 7th of November 1849
Commences with a light breeze from the S.E. with showers of rain, ship heading S.W. with all sail set the middle and latter part wind and weather the same nothing of the Whale kind six sail in sight the watch employed on Ship's Duty, variation of the compass 12 West
Lat by Obs 3.22 Long by Chron 22.53

Thursday November the 8th
Commences with a light breeze from the S.W. with occasional rain squalls, ship by the wind with all sail set standing S.W., the middle and latter part a fresh breeze from the S.S.E. and the weather fair, ship heading S.W.
Lat by Obs 1.58 North Long by Chron 23.30 West

Friday November the 9th
Commences with a brisk breeze from the S.S.E. and fair weather the ship with all sail set standing to the S.W., the watch employed with sundry jobs on the rigging, the middle and latter part brisk breezes and fine weather, thus it ends
Lat by Obs 2.0 miles North Long by Act 24.35 West

Saturday November the 10th
the first part of these twenty four hours a brisk breeze from the S.E. by S. attended with pleasant weather the ship with all sail set standing by the wind to the S.W. by S the middle and latter part a fresh breeze from the S.E. ship steering S.W. two sail in sight from aloft nothing of the Whale kind the watch employed on the rigging
Lat by Obs 1.21 South, long by Chron 25.30 variation of the compass 7 W

Sunday the 11th of November
commences with a brisk breeze from the S.E. by S. and fine pleasant weather ship with all drawing sail set steering S.W. at 4 P.M. the wind heaved to the S.S.E. same time set the larboard fore top mast standing sail, parted the Halyards and rove a new pair, at 9 P.M. furled the flying jib, through the night strong and steady breezes, the latter part wind and weather much the same, nothing of the Whale kind to cheer us on the way
Lat by Obs 3.45 South Long by Act 26.20
