

Remarks on the Passage to Warren & G.

Wednesday December the 31st 1851

Commenced with a light breeze from the Westward with warm pleasant weather, the ship with all drawing sail set steering S by E, the Middle & Latter part calm and pleasant, Nothing of the Whale kind the Watch Employed with sundry jobs about the rigging
Lat by Obs 18.59 South, Long by Act 151.00 West

Thursday January the 1st 1852

Commenced calm and very warm weather, the Middle and Latter part a light air from the North all sail set steering S by E, two sail in sight to the Northward Nothing of the Whale kind, to make a happy New Year,
Lat by Obs 19.14 South Long by Act 151.00 West

Friday January the 2nd

the first part of this twenty four hours a light air from the South and pleasant weather, the ship with all drawing sail set steering S by E, the Middle part baffling air and the Latter part calm and extremely warm weather
Lat by Act 19.25 South, Long as yesterday

Saturday January the 3rd

Commenced with calm & sultry weather at 3 P.M. took a breeze from ESE & braced sharp heading South with all sail set, the Middle part increasing breezes and cloudy at 6 A.M. furled the flying jib and at 10 following furled the fore & mizen top gallant sails, the Latter part strong breeze and rugged weather
Lat by Act 21.00 South, Long by Act 151.20 West

Sunday January the 4th

Commenced with strong trades from ESE and rugged, ship by the wind heading to the Southward at 4 P.M. furled the main top gallant sail, and at 6 P.M. single reefed the fore & mizen top sails at 8 P.M. closed down the main top sail to reef it and it blew to pieces, the sail having been in wear all the voyage through the night strong trades and rugged at 9 A.M. unbraced the main top sail & condemned it and bent another single reefed it and set it, the Latter part the same strong gales and clear rugged weather
Lat by Obs 22.40 South, Long by Act 152.00 West

Remarks

Monday January the 5th 1852

Commenced with strong trades from the ESE and rugged, the ship by the wind under single reef top sails heading to the South, the Middle & Latter part as the former
Lat by Obs 24.13 South, Long by Act 152.40 West

Tuesday January the 6th 1852

Commenced with strong trades from the ESE and rugged weather, the ship by the wind with all sail set heading S by W, the Middle and Latter part much the same Nothing of the Whale kind, to cheer us,
Lat by Obs 26.13 South, Long by Chron 153.55 West

Wednesday January the 7th

these twenty four hours commenced with a strong breeze from the ESE and rugged, the ship by the wind under whole top sails & main top gallant sail heading to the SSW. at 6 P.M. increasing breezes & furled the main top gallant sail at 1 A.M. set the main top gallant sail & at 6 furled it again the Latter part fresh gales & rugged, the Watch Employed repairing a fore sail. Nothing of the Whale kind
Lat by Obs 29.20 South, Long by Act 154.30 West

Thursday January the 8th

Commenced with a fresh gale from the SE and rugged weather, the ship by the wind under single reef fore & mizen & whole main top sails heading SSW. midnight more moderate and the wind veering to the Eastward at 1 A.M. set the reef out of the top sail and set the main top gallant sail, and at 4 A.M. set the fore & mizen top gallant sails, the Latter part a brisk breeze from the East and fine weather Courser ESE, the Watch Employed repairing a top sail, and sundry jobs about the rigging
Lat by Obs 30.23 South,

Friday January the 9th

Commenced with a brisk breeze from the Eastward and fine weather, the ship by the wind with all sail set heading ESE, at 4 P.M. unbraced the fore top sail & bent another, the Middle part calm & pleasant and the Latter part a light air from the NW, all drawing sail set steering S by E, the Watch Employed repairing sails
Lat by Obs 31.31 South, Long by Chron 155.16 West
