Remarks On Board Saturday September 8th 1838

First Part of these 24 hours Commences with Gentle Breeze from the S.E. Ship heading on a Wind to the East under all sail While Part Wind variable from S.E. to E.S. Ship heading to the Eastward at 6 AM saw the Island of Tristan da Cunha off the northern Bore Later Part Wind from the S.E. working the Ship towards the Land So Ends these 24 hours all hands Employed in Ships Duty

Remarks On Board Sunday September 9th 1838

First Part of the 24 Commences with fresh Breeze from the S.E. Ship on the Wind working up to the Land While Part Wind from the S.E. Ship on a Wind working up to the Land saw a hump Back Whale So Ends these 24 hours all hands Employed

Remarks On Board Monday September 10th 1838

First Part of these 24 hours Commences with Fresh Breeze from the East Ship heading in to the S.E. towards the Islands While Part Fresh Gale and thick rainy weather Wind Variable from the East to N.W. Ship heading off from the Land at 6 AM took in the Fore & Mizzen Top sails hauled the Fore Mast Later Part Wind from the N.W. blowing heavy Gale with heavy Showers of rain Ship heading to N.W. under Mast reef Main Top Sail So Ends these 24 hours all hands Employed

Remarks On Board Tuesday September 11th 1838

First Part of these 24 hours Commences with Fresh Breeze from the N.W. with a heavy sea running at 10 AM kept the Ship off by South towards the Land abode all sail on the Ship While Part Fresh Breeze & Squally Wind from the N.W. at 4 PM Double reefed the Top sails Ship lying off & on at the Island of Inaccessible at 7 AM Landed the Boat and went in to the Island saw several night Whales Waste Boat fastened to one of the 15 Spouting Blue Drained from the Whale & lost it So Ends these 24 hours with hard Luck, later Part thick rainy weather



Remarks On Board Wednesday September 12th 1838

First Part of these 24 hours Commences with Fresh Breeze from N.W. Ship lying off betwixt the Islands under Short Sail While Part Fresh Gale and Squally Wind under Mast reef Main Top sail Later Part the same Wind from the West Ship heading in towards the Islands So Ends these 24 hours all hands Employed

Remarks On Board Thursday September 13th 1838

First Part of these 24 hours Commences with Fresh Gale from the W.S.W. Ship heading in towards the Islands at 10 AM Lat Boat reefed Top sails and the sails While Part Fresh Breeze & Squally at 6 AM Landed the Boat and went in to the Island of Tristan da Cunha saw no Whales this day Later Part Gentle Breeze from the S.E. Ship lying off and on at the Island So Ends these 24 hours all hands Employed
