Mon the 28th

thick weather, steering S. E. Topmast
standing sail out. Saw several Fin Backs
Got a Porpoise and made him supper
At sun down set Mr. Royal

Tues the 29th

Commenced with light winds from the S. W.
& thick fog, ship steering S. E. saw a sail
Bearing N. W. at 7.30 P. M. saw several Fin Backs



Wed the 30th Light winds from W & thick weather
steering S. E. & L. at 7 A.M. crew employed.
In repairing Mr. Topmast at 12.30. Black
Raised a school of sperm whales covered
I struck one and stole him and to
Rugby he went all through carelessness.

Thurs the 31st

Commenced with light winds from S. W. clear.
Ship steering S. E. & L. employed in setting up
Mr. Y. Rigging, saw right whale
Lowered but did not strike

Friday Jan the 1st 1864

Commenced with light winds from N. W. W.
Clear weather, steering S. E. & L. at daylight
Raised Right Whales, covered but did not strike
All the forenoon but without success.

Sat the 2nd

Commenced with light winds from N. W. W. thick
weather, steering S. E. & L. at daylight broke
Our Water & Pork, at 4 P.M. washed off decks

Sun the 3rd

Commenced with strong wind from N. W.
With thick weather, steering S. E. at 3 P.M. took
In Mr. Y. sail, doubled reefed top sails
At 7 P.M. a strong gale from W. S. W.

Mon the 4th

Strong winds from S. W. steering S. E. & L. and
Dinner for the gunther and repaired, at 3 P.M.
Sunk it up again. At 7 P.M. wind from
the N. W. W. steering S. E. & L. Doubled
the Cape of Good Hope.
