Tuesday Jan the 12/64

Commenced with a
Fale from the W thick and cold weather
Steering S.E. by E. at 6.15 a.m. split from
top sail and sent it down and sent up
another one

Wed the 13th

Strong wind from E.W. thick weather at
10 a.m. sent down mainsail for repairs
At 2 P.m. sent down spanker for same
Repaired and sent them up again

Thurs the 14th

Commenced with light wind from N.W.
Steering S.E. by E. Cut up her fore top sail
for an awning to the overhead board.
Dried sails & C 4 P.m. washed off decks

Fri the 15th

Strong wind from E.N.E. steering S.E. thick
Weather employed in breaking out Bay
& Head at sundown Howling strong.

Tuesday Jan the 16th / 64

Commenced with
With strong wind from N.E. thick weather
Ship steering S.E. by E. nothing remarked
Occurred through the day.

Sun the 17th

Moderate wind from N.E. and thick weather
Steering S.E. Last night Capt. Butler took the
key of the planter's door & put it under his pillow
Heads so that no one could see the gun pans
& plates which that place contained there was
Nothing else to be seen for the gun had long
since been removed right to the after cabin

Mon the 18th

Commenced with light wind from N.E. steering S.E.
Broke out for what at 4 P.M. washed off decks
At sun down set No. Royal

Tues the 19th

Commenced with light winds from N.E. heading
S.E. by E. at noon in the Lat 38. 38' 5" Long 67. 10

Wed the 20th

Moderate wind from N.E. heading E. saw a number
of Fin Backs & a school of Kittiwakes
