Remarks

Sunday July 22^d 1855

This day comes in fine and light breezes from the E. ward. Toward 3^o ~~for~~ for what the Capt calls sperm whales but I say they are square headed grampuses we could not get a nearer one than you could at periwinkle at sunset got on board & shortened sail. Am wind to the west ward saw 3 sail steering E. ward. Thus ends

Monday July 23^d

These 24 hours come in fine with light breezes from the E. ward. Two sail in sight steering E. ward at sundown took in our light sails. Am continues fair. Set our light sails and sailed to the E. saw grampuses this continues the cook below sick

Tuesday July 24th

These 24 hours come in fair with light breezes from the E. ward steering N.E. saw grampuses at sunset in light sails. Am passing clouds and water weather and a small breeze from E. ward people employed variously. Thus ends

Wednesday July 25th 1855

This day comes in with cloudy weather and some rain at 3 saw the Island of Flores about bearing N by E about 20 miles dist. at sundown shortened sail to double reefed topsails the middle part raising the latter part fresh breeze from N.W. set topsails thus ends

Long by Chron 30.14 W

Remarks

Thursday July 26th

The fore part fine with light breezes from N.E. Ship steered towards the South at sunset shortened sail and lay by the wind heading to the E. ward. Am fresh breezes from N.W. and raining thus continues. Thus ends

Lat by obs 37.00 N

Remarks

Friday July 27th

This day comes in squally and raining from N.W. shortened sail to a double reefed main & sail and fore sail at 3 Am wore ship to the E. ward. The latter part strong breezes and fair weather ship under double reefed topsails and courses at 10 am spoke the ship Menurey Smith of New Bedford on which this continues
