

Barque Brunett towards Saint Catherine's

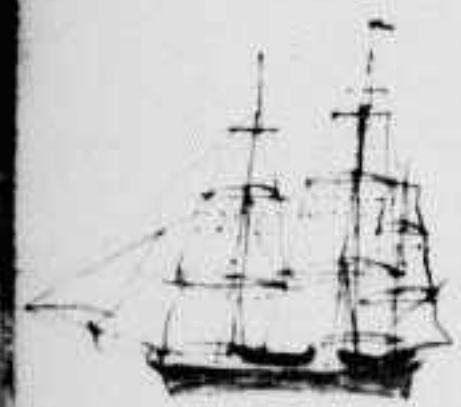
Friday
November 18 1842 first & middle part light airs & calms Capt Carr
came on board in the afternoon stayed & took tea gave him
some more wood; later strong breezes from the South
ward Barque heading W by S sent down the fore top
gallant yard fished it & mended the sail; Capt Luce
run-d sail mangle in his hand; 4 sails in sight from
the mast head do ends these 24 hours

Lat by obs $3^{\circ} 53' N$
Long by Chro $22^{\circ} 42' W$

Saturday
19 light winds from the Southward dead ahead for
us as it can blow; at 2 P.M. sent the fore top gallant
yard aloft & set the sail latter part the watch
employed in sundry jobs at 11 A.M. exchanged signals
with an American Whale Ship; saw a few Fin backs
going to the Northward & Westward slow & easy
do ends these 24 hours

Sunday
20 moderate breezes from the Southward; at 1 P.M. spoke Ship
Kosake of Thorne 32 months out with 25 blcks bound to
the Pacific game till 6:30 got some news papers & parted company
with her; middle part fine & clear; at daylight saw the Penobscot
about 5 miles off. hauled aboard the main yard and layed
an hour for her to come up with us some; at 11 A.M. exchanged
signals with an English Barque steering to the Northward & Westward
I wish was at home to day to attend church think could spend the
time much more agreeable than I do here; have ben unwell
this last 2 days both in body & mind: & surrounded with tempta-
tions on every hand but I am in hopes through the blessing of God
to overcome them all

Lat in to day $2^{\circ} 27' N$
Long by Chronometer $24^{\circ} 18' W$

Monday
Nov^r 21 up 16 fllt at 2 o'clock P.M. had a heavy squall & torrents of rain
1842 lasted about half an hour; chud down the topside at 3 made all
sail again latter part employed in mending the fly jib; one sail
in sight from the mast head do ends these 24 hours

Lat by obs $1^{\circ} 50' N$
Long by Chro $23^{\circ} 30' W$

Tuesday
22 light wind varying from S to S.E. Barque heading up S.W. &
off O.S. at 2 P.M. bent the fly jib at 3 spoke & gained
with Penobscot; got a grindstone out of her; gave them some
beard nothing of the fish kind in sight but fly fish; I am
in hopes to see an old Sam before long

Lat in by obs $00^{\circ} 58' N$
Long by Chro $24^{\circ} 02' W$

Wednesday
23 moderate breezes from the S.E. Barque S.W. at 8 o'clock
A.M. crossed the Equator in the long of $27^{\circ} 50'$ Septum
did not come on board as was expected; latter part
of the day got out beans vinegar & a bit of water
do ends these 24 hours

Lat by obs $18' South$
Long by Chro $24^{\circ} 02' W$

Thursday
24

first part fine weather wind from S.E. at 3 P.M.
spoke & gained with Penobscot till 10 in the evening;
Capt Luce gave the Boys pice for aft for a
Septum supper instead of shaving them; latter part
strong wind & squally
