

Brunett Towards the Western Ground
 Wednesday June 27th 1843 first part light airs from the S^W steering S^W as a course middle part wind varying from S^W to N^E and clouds at 5 AM commenced raining at 9 it cleared off set the light sails again made the mast heads saw lots of porpoises and one shark latter part light breeze from S to S^E steering S^W to S^E
 So ends these 24 hours
 Lat by obs. 5° 43' N
 Long by Chro 24 24

Thursday June 28th 1843 these 24 hours commenced with fresh breeze from the N^W by N course N^W at 5 PM Frank Hitecock by accident darted an iron pole against Boy John injuring one hand and leg very bad; middle part fresh breeze from the S^E; latter part light and variable the watch employed in making new masts out of whale lines; saw 2 few porpoises from the mast head
 So ends these 24 hours
 Lat by obs. 6° 33' N
 Long by Chro 24 48 W

Friday June 29th these 24 hours commenced with light winds and small showers from the Southward steering N^W by N at 3 PM hove to after Black Fish but without success; at 4 came on board took up the Boats middle tempestuous with copious showers took in and set the light sails several times at 2 AM cleared off; at 9 AM exchanged signals with a French Barque standing to the Southward latter part fresh breeze from the S^E
 So ends Lat in 7° 20' N
 Long in 24 52 W

E M^o S^oc^o Master
 Saturday June 30th 1843 these 24 hours moderate breeze from the N^E course N^W middle part thunder & lightning accompanied with torrents of rain latter part some better the watch variously employed in Ships duty thus ends
 Lat in 7° 55' N
 Long 25 42 W

Sunday June 31th 1843 these 24 hours commenced with fresh breeze from the N^E by N course N^W middle part wind light and variable with torrents of rain; at daylight had a moderate tempest; hauled the light sails latter part weather some better a heavy squall coming from the N^E 11 months out to day with windly: 3 10 6 6 6
 Lat by D. R. 8° 20' N
 Long do 26 08 W

Monday June 1st 1844 these 24 hours commenced with light breeze from the N^E and fine rain Barque heading S^W to S^E after 4 PM turned all hands to and gave the decks an extra scrubbing with fresh water & sand middle part fine and clear wind from the Northward latter fresh breeze the N^E with passing clouds course N^W by N carrying all sail the watch variously employed
 So ends
 Lat by obs 9° 32' N
 Lat by D. R. 8° 55' N
 Long do 26 00 W
